Traveling Man Well Known on Coos Bay Dies in Portland

The many friends of James C. Murray, who has made the Coos Bay territory for many years will learn with genuine regret of his death at his home in Portland last Friday.

For 17 years prior to his death he represented a San Francisco hardware firm, with headquarters in Portland. Previous to that time he represented Goldsmith & Loewenberg for 20 years.

He was one of the older members of the Elks' lodge, of Portland, which he joined in 1897. He belonged also to the United Commercial Travelers' Association, the Oregon and Washington Beneficial League and Oregon Assembly No. 1, of the United Artisans.

Mr. Murray was born at Mill Plain, Wash., August 4, 1852, and spent his early boyhood there. He is survived by his wife and three daughters, Mrs. Leun Abrams, Mrs. E. F. Greene and Mrs. William Brandes. Funeral services will be held tomorrow under the auspices of the Portland Lodge of Elks.

# NORTH BEND MAN DISAPPEARS

Charles McCarty, Restaurant Man, Mysteriously Missing and Place Closed.

Charles McCarty, a well-known cook and restaurant man has mysteriously disappeared from North Bend. McCarty has resided on Coos Bay for some time and has held jobs in the camps at various eating places.

Recently he purchased the restaurant in North Bend which he conducted for a short time, but a week ago he suddenly and mysteriously dropped out of sight. As he made no arrangements for continuing the business and took the key with him, the restaurant has remained closed.

As his rent is paid to July 1 and he left no debts, his friends are at a loss to account for the strange and sudden disappearance.

McCarty was not a drinking man and there was nothing in his actions to cause suspicion.

There are rumors connecting his name with an alleged white slave case, but this is denied. As he has no relatives here, there has been no particular effort to locate him, his friends expecting him to turn up daily, but as he has been gone more than a week there is some anxiety as to his disappearance.
