Broke Window.—Unknown parties last evening broke out a large glass in the front of Bahr's new barber shop on Market avenue near the water front. There is no clue as to who did it or why.

Many Blackberries.—There is said to be an unusually large crop of wild blackberries in the woods around Coos Bay now. The berries are just ripening and many pickers are visiting the favorite spots.

Lecturer Coming.—Bicknell Young, C. S. B., a member of the Board of Lectureship of the First Church of Christ, Christian Scientist, of Boston, Mass., is expected here to deliver a lecture Tuesday evening, July 15, at the Masonic Opera House.

Undergoes Operation.—Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Sneddon received word yesterday that their son-in-law, H. W. Bedford, of Coalinga, Cal., had recently undergone a severe surgical

operation for appendicitis and intestinal trouble at the Mayo Brothers' Hospital, Rochester, Minn. Mrs. Bedford accompanied him East.

Will Move.—The old Coast Mail building on North Front street is being remodelled by the Flanagan estate. Peterson and Kronholm will move the Union Saloon from near the Postoffice into part of it.

Ready to Register.—Justice Penock today received the blanks and registration blanks for the Central Marshfield precinct and is now ready to register voters. The new law requires three blanks to be filled out and a complete description of the voter is given, even to the color of the eyes. Two freeholders must swear to the eligibility of the voter.

To Marshfield.—The Good River Glacier says: "Webster Kent is in Marshfield, where he has the contract for painting a large building, which is just being completed by Joe M. Wright, formerly Mayor of this city, who has gone to the Southern Oregon coast city and is again in the contracting and building business."

Honor Frizeen.—At a meeting of the Linea Society last evening, August Frizeen was honored by being elected president for the ensuing year. The officers chosen were: President, August Frizeen; vice-president, E. M. Nordstrom; recording secretary, Wm. Burman; financial secretary, Axel Anderson; treasurer, Herman Erickson, master of ceremonies, Peter Erickson.

New Lodge.—C. H. Marsh and C. F. McKnight have returned from Langlois where they went with Mr. Miller to aid in instituting the new Masonic lodge. It was organized by C. F. McKnight a year ago under a dispensation and has just been granted a charter. It is Golden West Lodge No. 123, A. F. & A. M. J. A. Cox is master. The Langlois Masons showed the visitors a fine time. Mr. Miller returned via Myrtle Point and Roseburg to his home at Albany.

Funeral Today.—The funeral of the seven-week-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Pomponno, of Henryville, was held today, the Rev. Father A. R. Munro officiating. The child was smothered. The father, who is an Italian and talks broken English, said that they had read that there should be a separate bed for the baby, but his wife loved the little one so much that she wanted to keep him with her all the time. He was their only child and their loss excited much sympathy here.

NINE COUNTY PRISONERS.

There are nine prisoners in the county jail at present, this number exceeding the capacity of the bastille by one. The corridor is being occupied by the extra. The last to register at Hotel de Gage was Bill Poulos a Marshfield Greek, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. He was captured at Drain and brought back by the sheriff. Three of the prisoners are being worked on the county roads.—Coquille Sentinel.

SIX ACRES OF STRAWBERRIES.

H. L. Varney is probably one of the busiest men in this neck-o'-the-woods just now. Mr. Varney has six acres planted to strawberries, and although but two acres are in bearing he is picking—and has been for the past 16 days—an average of 50 crates per day. Some of the bearing plants are fully two feet across at the top, and are literally borne down by the weight of the berries, which are large and luscious. In numerous instances less than 25 berries fill a box, and in one particular instance 11 heaped a quart box. The four additional acres will be in bearing next season. Mr. Varney has an aggregate of 27,600 plants. At present he is shipping to Bandon.—Coquille Sentinel.
