## THE FAREWELL OF REV. BASS

### Expresses Appreciation, Discusses I. W. W. Deportation and Speaks of Future Marshfield.

At the Baptist church last night addressing a very representative audience of Marshfield's citizens, Pastor Bassford, the retiring pastor of the local church spoke in part as follows:

"Before beginning the discussion of the evening I would like to say a word or two of appreciation since this is the last time I shall have the pleasure of addressing you, at least for some time. I deeply appreciate the noble spirit of my collaborators, especially the church officials who have carefully supported my freedom of utterance and when differing have yet been broad and christian enough to differ without making themselves disagreeable. The choir has always been dependable and rendered helpful music which has added largely to the helpfulness of our services. I thank God for the noble women who have quietly but cheerfully borne much of the burden of the routine work. I am proud of the young people who have honored me by always regarding me as one of their number. I shall not soon forget the happy times we have had together. I thank God for the love and friendship of the little children. I love every one of them, and have often found rich pleasure in their company. I deeply appreciate the sympathy, cooperation, generous hospitality and friendship of the members of both the church and congregation who have shown me much kindness. I shall always think of you with pleasure, and if I have been a help to any of you I am happy in the thought of it. I have a large debt of gratitude to pay to those who have waited upon my ministry and supported my efforts by their presence. Never have I addressed audiences as attentive and responsive as you have been. Again and again in hours of weakness your interest has made me strong and turned what would have been a burden into a pleasure. And last but not least, I am deeply indebted to a public-spirited press which has never denied me space whenever I had a message for the public ear. Especially am I indebted to The Coos Bay Times for the generosity of its editors who have extended every courtesy a newspaper can offer and always willingly and without financial return.

I am sincerely sorry to leave Marshfield, for I like the town and love its people and believe in its future; and there is no place I know of where one could invest his life in the public service to better advantage. I assure you that only the claims of ill health—for which the climate is in no way responsible—could induce me to leave this place.

In leaving I can say in all sincerity that I have nothing but a benediction of love and good will for every man, woman and child in this church, this congregation and this community.

**The I. W. W. Demonstration.**

A number have asked me to express my opinion of the recent public demonstration against the local I. W. W. agitators. I believe that when any member of a community does that which is unjust and injurious to the other members of the community the people have a right to adjudge him an undesirable member of the social body and may then warn him that unless he changes his ways, he must leave the town for the common good. If he fails to change his ways or leave when told, then in self-protection, the people are justified in deporting him. But this should be a last measure and should be used only after having given fair warning and a reasonable time in which to leave. But when a group of citizens deport men in the interest of law and order, they must be careful not to do it in a lawless and disorderly manner. With a few minor exceptions, the recent demonstration was carried out in a proper spirit and an orderly manner, and the minor exceptions were due largely to the fact that there was no authorized or appointed head to the demonstration. I believe a citizen is no more called upon to stand by and see his city despoiled and not protest than a father to stand by and see his family ruined and not make serious effort to protect his own.

In such a gathering as that of Wednesday there is always the danger of its degenerating into mob rule, and in the name of law and the public good there is likely to result acts of lawlessness which are a public disgrace. It was noticeable to all in the party that a few light-headed or hot-headed men would like to have stamped the crowd and done overt acts of violence and injustice on the slightest provocation. Such men are easily and readily inspired to be brave and daring when there are 46 to 2. At least two different men in the party had a loaded revolver and any man who will carry such a weapon on such an occasion when the odds are 46 to 2 in his favor is either a thoughtless fool or a contemptible coward. It is such men as these who make these demonstrations dangerous, especially where there is no re-

recognized or authorized leader group. Fortunately the sense and good sense of the rest of the group prevented any such acts of any violence in this instance.

I understand that some have questioned the wisdom of my being present at this gathering, on the ground that I am a minister and a minister has no right to be thus occupied. I do not know what such people consider a minister and his duties to be. But I, for one, believe a minister is not a mollycoddle but a man and that nothing which concerns the welfare of men should be alien to him. He ought certainly to be a patriotic citizen seriously interested in the common weal. Because I consider myself such a man and such a citizen, in the interest of both the men and the city, I attended this demonstration. It was my duty, as it was that of every other citizen, so far as he was able, to see that both the men and the city got a square deal. And I believe that with the exception of a minor detail or two both the men were fairly treated and the city properly represented. The men were fed, properly instructed, and had enough money on their persons to carry them a thousand miles away from here, if necessary. Having done what I thought was my duty as a man and a citizen it is a matter of indifference to me what others think of my conduct.

### Local Social Conditions.

Turning for a moment from the economic to the social conditions of the community, it seems to me a pity that since so large a body of citizens have departed these men they could not now have a deportation of the men here who are socially undesirable and so, thoroughly clean up our city. It might be that this would result in the deportation of so many as to seriously cripple our community activities for a time. In that event we might deport them in relays with instructions to return only after they had cleaned up and intended to remain cleaned up, that if they returned otherwise a coat of tar and feathers and another deportation would be awaiting them. For we have no need of moral lepers and social parasites.

It is becoming increasingly evident that we can not expect any relief from the present city administration. If private citizens know where these open houses of shame are, then the officials, if they are on their job must know too. If they do not, they have no business on the job. Therefore, it is our duty to see to it that at the coming election men are nominated and elected who stand for a clean and decent city, and who will have sufficient backbone and love for the city to see that it is kept clean without being compelled to. As public-spirited citizens we must regard our city too highly to see it defiled and diseased by these vile social ulcers. I raise no alarmist's cry when I say that there is good reason to fear that unless we clean up our own dirt and save our city's fair name from the shame of this dishonor, some one will come from the outside and clean it up for us, and we shall have then the undesirable notoriety and disgrace that will result from our city's shame being spread broadcast through the public press. If we truly desire the good of our city, we ought not to wait for this. For this is the worst blow our city could be called upon to sustain. It would do us more damage than thousands of dollars put into advertising would do good. The best advertisement this city can have is not resources, great and numerous as they are, not its location, strategic as it undoubtedly is, but the reputation of being a clean home-like and law-respecting city. The respectable class of immigrants who have families and make the most desirable additions, if they come, are not going to remain when they learn that we have 15 saloons on our front street, and more than that many houses of shame, whose vile traffic is winked at by the city's officials. Parents are not going to stay in such a community and involve their children in such moral risks. We have every facility for destroying our youth; ought we not to provide some means for saving them? Have the women and little children no claim upon our manhood and womanhood?

I assure you in all sincerity that it would be the joy of my life to help the good people of Marshfield to make this city one of the cleanest, most wholesome and thoroughly democratic in the entire Northwest. May the God who was the Father of Jesus Christ, the friend of the weak and the oppressed, strengthen you in every good work for the civic, social and moral betterment of Marshfield.
