PLANT LOGANBERRIES.

N THOSE parts of the west that are adapted to the culture of the loganberry, hundreds of acres are being planted to that hybrid fruit that is of growing importance. demand for the herry cannel or evaporated is much in excess of the present supply, and there seems no limit to the extending of the demand. It has been said that the Coes Bay and Coquille valley sections are natural homes for the loganberry, but no attemps had been made to go into the culture on an extensive scale.

In other districts where the berry is grown commercially, it returns as high as \$400 per acre, and la fast

supplanting other crops.
