### PLAY BANDON JULY FOURTH

#### Chas. Tower Picks All-Star Team in Marshfield for Game—Baseball Talk

Chas. Tower today is getting his All-Star Coos County League team in readiness for a big game with the Bandon League team at Bandon July Fourth. He is getting a strong bunch and hopes to take the league leaders down the line some.

Bandon was expecting the regular Marshfield league team there for the Fourth of July game but Manager O'gren through a misunderstanding arranged three games with North Bend. However, some of Marshfield's best players will go with Tower's team. The team will receive \$120 for the game at Bandon and North Bend pays the Marshfield league team \$450 for the three games. However, if Sunday's game is pulled off in Marshfield Marshfield will have to refund \$100 for it.

Mr. Tower will be captain and manager and his team will probably consist of Norm Johnson and Abbott as a battery, and S. Tower, Geo. Johnson, S. Briggs, Ives, Woods, Walter Jensen.

At North Bend, Marshfield will have the same lineup as played Coquille last Sunday with the exception that Al Jensen, an oldtime player, will probably play first base.

Coquille and Myrtle Point will play at Coquille July Fourth and at Myrtle Point the fifth and sixth, the latter probably being the postponed league game.

**Elks' Game Off.**  
As a result of the game here next Sunday being between North Bend and Marshfield, it is understood that the Bandon Elks have called off their return game with Marshfield slated for that date. R. E. L. Beddilion, who came here from Bandon last night, said that the Bandon Elks did not feel that without the league team they could bring a sufficient crowd to warrant a special train excursion.

### RUSHING ROAD TO GRANTS PASS

#### Rapid Progress Reported in Promotion of Line to Crescent City.

The Grants Pass Courier reports rapid progress in the promotion of the proposed line from that place to Crescent City. The Courier says: "Matters concerning the building of the Grants Pass-Crescent City railroad are fast assuming definite shape, and history will surely be made with rapidity during the next week. Mayor Smith and Dr. Reddy are each in receipt of communications from the California people who are backing the new road, and in a wire to the mayor from Franklin Helm, dated at San Francisco Saturday, the statement is made that the arrangements are definitely arranged for the financing of the road, and a party of the gentlemen will arrive here the present week to complete the details. Attorney Massick, who was here from New York at the instance of the California people, and who left for Alaska after investigating and advising upon the local bond issue, will return on the 5th of July, and will be met here by Mr. Helm. Mr. Massick is to advise regarding the issue of railroad bonds covering the line from Grants Pass to Crescent City, this issue to be of several million dollars.

Mr. Helm also announced in a wire to Mayor Smith that John Shepard, the Boston capitalist; Dr. Stone, of Phoenix, Arizona; Attorney Brun, representing the French interests; and W. J. Sage, of San Francisco, would arrive at the same time, and would remain as long as was necessary. These gentlemen constitute the construction department of the organization, and it is announced that they will open office headquarters upon their arrival, and would transact the business in future from here. In telephone communication with Mr. Helm Saturday, Mayor Smith was assured that an additional block of city warrants would be cashed by him, and that the proceeds from it would be available the first of the week, this in contemplation of the commencement of immediate work of grading upon the right-of-way out of Grants Pass, this right-of-way having been already cleared ready for the graders.

The local bond issue matter is being taken up to the supreme court in a friendly suit, and opinion is expected from that body within a few weeks. Neither the New York bond attorneys upon whose advice the case was taken up, or local attorneys, expect other than a favorable decision, but inasmuch as the issue involved new questions of authority under the constitution, the decision was thought essential. Meantime, Mayor Smith announces that an election will be held to further validate the issue, the interest rate to be made six per cent, as at that rate the issue will sell at par.

Taken all in all, the railroad situation has reached a most promising stage, and developments will surely come with little further delay. It has taken time to bring the various interests together, the promotion of a project involving millions not being accomplished in a day. But all interested in the building of the road are moving forward with certainty, and all speak of the project as ac-
