Both men showed wear and tear in the eighth and missed many blows. In the ninth, Anderson turned and ran and Cross planted a hard right on his spine. Anderson turned and met four rights and lefts that fell flush on the jaw. Cross slammed Anderson almost at will in this round.

Cross won in the twelfth round on a knockout.

Ritchie peppering the Mexican with left and right swings to jaw. Ritchie kept this up until round ended. Ritchie's round.

**Sixth Round.**  
Rivers rushed to close quarters but was sent back with ripping volley of rights and left short arm punches. Time and again Ritchie sent right and left crashing to body and face. Ritchie's round.

**Seventh Round.**  
Ritchie outboxed and outfought Rivers, landing on the Mexican's mouth and face and closing Rivers' eye. Suddenly Rivers threw himself at Ritchie and nearly sent him through the ropes with combined force of right swings and body. Rivers held Ritchie at disadvantage until gong sounded.

**Eighth Round.**

Ritchie almost lifted the Mexican off his feet with a terrific left uppercut to jaw, followed by a succession of half arm jolts to face. Rivers drank whiskey during the intermission.

**Eleventh Round.**  
Ritchie scored twice to jaw with right and Rivers took count and rose to feet gasping. Champion rushed at him again, flooring him with left uppercut to jaw and right across to same place. Rivers was counted out.
