A SEA EJABILITY BILL.

Congressman Peters, of Massachusetts, has introduced a bill in the House of Representatives for the maintenance of actions for death on the high seas and other navigable waters. Owners of vessels are made liable to suits for damages by the heirs of anyone dying through the culpability of the owners of the vessel, the compensation to be fair and just.
