ROSEBURG, July 10.—The Evening News says: "That Ray Diamond, the youthful Glendale bank robber, deliberately planned to rob the Glendale State Bank, and was not inspired to commit the crime on the impulse of the moment as stated by Diamond in interviews with representatives of the press yesterday, was the declaration of District Attorney George M. Brown this afternoon.

"In a private interview with the District Attorney late yesterday Diamond admitted that he had prepared food to nourish him during the time consumed in making his get-away and had even gone so far as to plan his route of escape. Ac-

According to District Attorney Brown Diamond had planned to strike south and eventually reach Eureka, California, where he intended to board a boat and make his get-away. In some manner he followed the wrong trail, according to the District Attorney, and wended his way into Curry County where he was a practical stranger. Haunted by persons whom he thought were on his trail, and being in a strange country, the District Attorney says Diamond decided to surrender. "Had he followed his original plans, the District Attorney is of the belief that he would have made every effort to escape. District Attorney Brown declares that Diamond is a criminal of vain type, and is not a mere irresponsible lad, as some would believe.

"District Attorney Brown says Diamond not only evidenced premeditation of the robbery in his movement, but also in the statements uttered by him yesterday. Diamond is a boastful talker, and appears delighted when given an opportunity to relate the tale of the holdup and his subsequent escape."

"It does not appear likely that the court will be asked to act with leniency in his case. On the contrary he will be expected to pay the penalty for his crime—regardless of any sentimental feeling that may enter into the case.

"As far as the booze is concerned, District Attorney Brown says it was drunk by Diamond with a view of nerveing him for the crime—the same as hundreds of other criminals have done in the past.

"It is the District Attorney's belief that Diamond thought he was hunted and would be captured—and to play a safe game decided to surrender. It is not the District Attorney's belief that Diamond committed the robbery on the impulse of the moment, or that he decided to surrender through a desire to return and face the penalty."

BIG OUTPUT OF DAIRIES

COOS BAY ICE AND COLD STORAGE COMPANY AVERAGING ABOUT 600 POUNDS OF CHEESE AND 800 POUNDS OF BUTTER PER DAY.

The Coos Bay Ice and Cold Storage Company is making a new record this year in the output of butter and cheese. For the past two months the plant has been averaging about 4000 pounds of butter and about 3000 pounds of cheese every five days.

Manager C. E. Nicholson this morning expressed gratification over the way business was going. The daily average of about 600 pounds of cheese and about 800 pounds of butter takes an immense amount of milk and cream from the ranches in the vicinity. So far the milk and cream supply has held up well.

The prices are fair, the slump a while back not being followed by the further decline that some then feared.

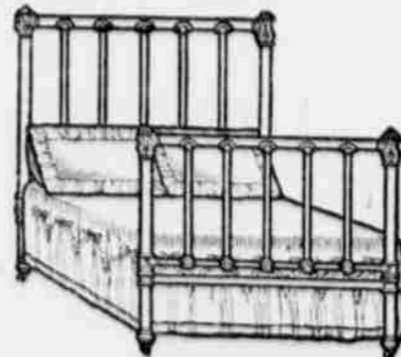
