MAYOR ACTS AS A PEACEMAKER

Trouble Between Contractors Twohy and Employers Finally Adjusted at Eugene.

EUGENE, Ore., July 11.—The Guard says: "Mayor D. E. Yoran this morning succeeded in adjusting a misunderstanding between railroad contractors and a crowd of men who were shipped to Eugene to work for Porter Brothers on the Willamette Pacific railway by the Cosmopolitan employment agency of San Francisco. The men, about 75 in number, declared that the agent who sent them had promised them transportation to the front and that when they reached Eugene they found they were supposed to pay \$1.15 for transportation to a point 23 miles from Eugene, and walk the rest of the way to the work. They struck and refused to go.

"A representative of Twohy Bros. then offered to carry the men free to Portola, but some of the leaders persuaded most of them not to go, claiming that it was another 'skin game' and that if they went, they would be badly treated. A number of the men appeared in a body before Mayor Yoran and laid the matter before him. The mayor got H. P. Hoey, chief of the construction engineers of the Southern Pacific at Eugene; the local representative of McArthur, Perks & Co., under whom Porter Bros. have a subcontract; a representative of the Hanley employment agency, and a representative of Twohy Bros. and had a hearing on the street.

"As far as could be learned, it is usual for Porter Brothers and the Hanley agency to give a slip to the men, telling them of the conditions under which they are carried to the front, including the statement with reference to the fee of \$1.15 for 23 miles, and the fact that they are supposed to walk the rest of the way. In this case the men were not sent either by the Porter Bros. direct or through the Hanley agency, which ordinarily sends the men, but through the Cosmopolitan, whose agents, the workmen declared, were derelict in their duty and misrepresented facts. On learning that Twohy Bros. had offered to carry the men to their job free, Mayor Yoran asked the workmen if they would go to work at Portola if taken out. A dozen of them consented and went to the front. Ten others had previously gone to Twohy Bros. after their disagreement with Porter Bros.

"Mayor Yoran said that he did not want to blame anybody, but wanted to see that the railroad company, the contractors and the men
