SOCIALISTS COUNTY MEET

Dr. Leach Had, as County Chairman, Issued Call for Convention at Coquille.

(Special to The Times.) BANDON, Or., July 12.—A call was issued by Dr. B. K. Leach, of Bandon, who was deported yesterday as an undesirable citizen, because of his attacks on the citizens of Marshfield for deporting the I. W. W. members from there, in the last issue of his paper, for a Coos County Socialist convention to be held at Coquille, Friday, July 18. The convention was called for John Quick's shop. It was stated that the principal business would be to raise funds to establish a Socialist paper in Coos County, for which he said \$500 had been pledged and \$500 more would be needed. It was also stated that a new secretary-treasurer would have to be elected to succeed C. B. Ellis who lately resigned. Ellis was the organizer who was arrested for violating the anti-street speaking rule in Marshfield and left the Bay shortly before the deportation of the I. W. W. began. Since the sudden departure of Dr. Leach, it is expected that a new county chairman will have to be chosen, as he signed the call for the convention as county chairman.

FATHER DIED IN EAST TODAY

Cassius Peck, Father of C. R. Peck, Succumbs at Old Home in Vermont.

Following an illness of several months, Cassius Peck, of Burlington, Vermont, father of Cassius Peck, died today in Burlington, Arthur K. Peck is now en route to Marshfield, after having been with his father for several weeks. Mr. Peck has been prominent in the public life of Vermont for many years. At the time of his death he was a trustee of the University of Vermont and of the Vermont Soldiers' Home. He also was a member of the Medal of Honor Legion, being awarded a medal of honor by Congress for special bravery displayed in the Civil War during the battle of Antietam. Mr. Peck is survived by three sons and three daughters.

Died Today.—Mrs. E. D. Mickel died today at the Coos Hotel. She was the mother of Mrs. S. N. Croft, of Bandon, and The Times yesterday told of the efforts of her children to grant her dying wish—that she might be brought to their Pacific Coast home to die. She had almost reached her goal when her strength gave out and she succumbed to complications due to old age. She will be taken to Bandon for burial.

OBITUARY.

Francis J. Gamble died in San Diego, Cal., Monday, June 30, after a lingering illness of tuberculosis. While his condition had been considered serious for some time, the end came suddenly and was a great shock to his relatives and friends. He was born on the farm home, Kentuck Inlet, February 15, 1859, and spent all of his life on Coos Bay, until three years ago when he went to Albuquerque, New Mexico, for the benefit of his health. While there he met and married Alice M. Still, from whom he separated in 1912. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. W. H. Gamble, who resides at North Bend; three sisters and four brothers, all of whom reside on the Bay, except one sister, Mrs. D. P. McKee, of San Francisco, California. The remains arrived on the Nann Smith today and the funeral services will be held Sunday at 2:00 o'clock p. m., from the Wilson Chapel under the auspices of the Order of Owls, of which the deceased was a member. Rev. Browning officiating. Interment will be in I. O. O. F. Cemetery, Marshfield.

ELECTRICITY FOR TUNNELS

ENGINEER NAYLOR BRINGS THE EQUIPMENT TO SCHOFIELD FOR CONSTRUCTION OF A BIG BORE UNDER HILLS—OTHER NEWS. (Special to The Times.) SCHOFIELD, July 12.—Mr. Naylor, electrical engineer for Porter Brothers, has returned from Portland with a complete electric plant which will be installed immediately. Lights will be placed in the tunnel, along the dump tracks and in all the company's buildings. In connection with the new lighting system to permit night and day tunnel work, a huge electric fan will be operated to insure fresh air in the tunnel. Miss Jennie Walker who has a school up Smith river spent the Fourth here with relatives and friends. Henry Copenhagen of Copenhagen Brothers' contracting firm, is here from Portland checking up the business of the company. The right-of-way is practically cleared to the Impqua at Reedspout, and the steam shovel is making good time in that direction. They expect to have a camp at the mouth of Smith river in a few weeks, and, to facilitate their movements, have built their new bunk houses on rafts. C. D. Crichton is in charge of the tunnel work during the absence of Mr. Nelson. Mr. Crichton's father died recently. Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Holstrom of Smith river, were guests at the Henderson home on the 4th and 5th.

RAILWAY MEN COMING TO BAY

Johnson Porter and Grant Smith Due Today—Brunnough and Wisley Coming

Word was received here that Grant Smith and Johnson Porter and possibly some others of the firm of Grant Smith and Porter Brothers, contractors of the Coos Bay and Eugene line of the Southern Pacific, would reach here this afternoon or evening. It is presumed that they are coming in on an inspection trip, possibly about the contract for the piers and approaches for the bridge across Coos Bay. No official announcement has been made concerning the awarding of the contract, but it is believed that Porter Brothers and Mr. Smith have secured it. They also own considerable Coos Bay property, including the old Breakwater dock, and they will probably look after it while here. It has not been announced to what use the old Breakwater dock will be put to.
