Dr. Leach Had, as County Chairman, Issued Call for Convention at Coquille.

(Special to The Times.)
BANDON, Or., July 12.—A call
was issued by Dr. B. K. Lench, of
Bandon, who was deported yesterday
as an undesirable citizen, because of his attacks on the citizens of Marshfield for deporting the I. W. W. members from there, in the last issue of his paper, for a Coos County Socialist convention to be held at Coquille, Friday, July 18. The convention was called for John Quick's shop.

It was stated that the principal business would be to raise funds to establish a Socialist paper in Coos County, for which he said \$800 been pledged and \$800 more would be needed.

It was also stated that a new secretary-treasurer would have to be elected to succeed C. B. Ellis who lately resigned. Ellis was the organizer who was arrested for vio-lating the anti-street speaking rule in Marshfield and left the Bay shortly before the deportation of the I. W. W. began.

Since the sudden departure of Dr. Leach, it is expected that a new county chairman will have to be chosen, as he signed the call for the convention as county chairman.
