Prepare for Bridging.—Anderson and Klockers are driving the piling for the trestle out to the first pier of the bridge across Coos Bay and should have it completed by the last of the week. No news has been received relative to the bridge contract. Grant Smith may come in today from the north.

No Kinney News.—Up to this afternoon, Major Kinney had not received any word as to developments in the Wisley deal. It is understood that P. B. Walte was in Portland Saturday conferring with Wisley and Bronaugh and some of them may be in on the Breakwater tomorrow.

Gets Divorce.—Judge Coke Saturday afternoon granted Mrs. Andrew Stambuck a decree of divorce. The couple lived on Coos river and last year had considerable trouble that was aired in Justice Pennock's court. Mrs. Stambuck had several children by a previous marriage, her former husband, Jas. Foster, being dead.

Pays Fine.—Ed Lindberg today paid a \$15 fine for violating the speed limit July 5. At first he and Chas. Bonebrake testified that they were out at South Slough at the time the alleged speeding occurred but later they corrected their testimony as they went to South Slough on July 6 instead of July 5. Constable Cox, Marshal Carter and others testified concerning the speeding on North Front street.

Fear for Fisherman.—Last Thursday, July 10, Jerry Blanchard and Chas. Albert left North Bend in a sail boat to go out over the bar to try their luck at deep sea fishing. They took little provision and were not planning on a long trip. Friday the keeper of the Blanco lighthouse sighted them off the cape, but since then no word has been received and their friends are at a loss to account for their absence.

Will Lay Cable.—A delegation consisting of Charles Hanson and Mr. Lundgren of Ten Mile, and D. B. Brainard and Prof. A. G. Ranbe, of Kentuck Inlet, representing the Kenwill Telephone company, appeared before the Port Commission this morning and secured a permit to lay a telephone cable across the bay at Glasgow. The cable is now ready and work of laying it will commence soon.

This does not include the heating, plumbing, painting or wiring. The bidding on the job was spirited, eight contractors seeking the work. On the large honor of the two, there was a difference of \$700 between the high and the low bidders. It is said that the contractors and lumber dealers are now figuring closer on work than they ever have on Coos Bay.

Fear Friends Dead. R. H. Corey and wife are anxiously awaiting definite news as to the fate of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Smith, of Portland, who were lost last week while trying to ascend Mount St. Helens. The Oregonian arriving today states that hope has been given up of finding the couple alive. Mr. and Mrs. Corey knew the missing couple well, having lived neighbors to them in Portland for some time and were deeply interested in the first news of the affair which appeared in The Times last Friday evening.

Novel Liquor Case.—Judge Coke is wrestling with a novel liquor case from Cottage Grove that was submitted to him when he was holding court at Eugene recently. Dr. Oglesby, of Cottage Grove, was indicted for illicit traffic in liquor, it being charged that he had made a practice of issuing prescriptions to "soaks" so that they could get liquor at the drug store. Cottage Grove being a dry town. Oglesby's attorneys have demurred to the indictment on the ground that the Oregon law does not provide any punishment for such an offense, claiming the law regulating the sale of liquor by drug stores only provides punishment for the druggist, the physician being exempt.
