HOW TO CARE FOR DOG BITE

Oregon State Board of Health Gives Instructions About Dealing With Wounds.

PORTLAND, Or., July 18 .- Josoph Norton, proprietor of the Olym-pia hotel. Sixth and Irving streets, received word from Marshfield that his daughter, Mrs. Charles Seafuse, and been bitten by a pet dog one week ago. Although the wound has been cauterized three times it has been cauterized three times it is still causing some trouble. In view of the recent cases of hydrophobia in this city Norton requested his daughter to come here immediately for the Pasteur treatment. In a recent bulletin issued by the Oregon state board of health, the following advice is given in case of a dog bite:

"The wound should be tremediated.

"The wound should be immediated by cauterized with nitric acid and dressed antiseptically. If the wound fressed antiseptically. If the would is deep, involving the periosteum or the eye, it should be washed with a bichloride of mercury so-

As the organism causing the disase is probably a protozoan, theo-etically a saturated solution of quinine would be an ideal dressing. However, this is purely problematical. The patient is advised not to depend on peroxide or turpen-

"The board also recommends that the animal should never be killed, but should be confined in some enclosure and kept in confinement for a definite length of time. If the animal does not show any symptoms of rables after being contined for a week or ten days the matter may be dismissed. If the dog is rabid it will certainly die.

"In killing an animal it is sug-sested that it be killed in such a manner as not to destroy the
