New Game Laws For Coos County

Clip this out for your reference

Grouse and Native Pheasant season opens October 1, closes October 31. Bag limit five of any or all such birds during one day, or ten during any seven consecutive days.

Ducks, geese, rails, coots and shore birds opens September 15, closes December 31. Bag limit, thirty of such birds in seven consecutive days. Snipe known locally as "Sandpeeps" protected at all times; also swan.

Quail season opens October 1 and closes October 31. Bag limit—ten in any seven consecutive days.

Wild Pigeons—Season opens September 1, closes October 31. Bag limit—ten in any one day or twenty in any seven consecutive days.

Deer season opens August 1 and closes October 31. Limit three bucks in one season.

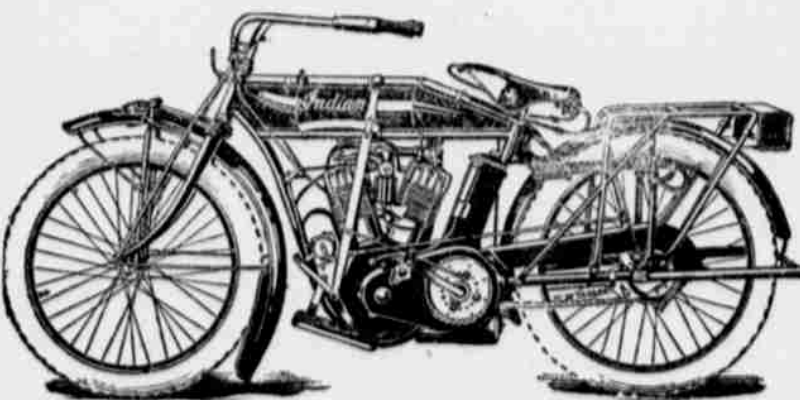

How the Elgin National Motorcycle Race Was Won



COOS BAY motorcycle riders were all interested in the details of the great National motorcycle race which was recently run in Illinois. It was the biggest race in the United States and the last issue of the great motorist magazine, Motorcycle Illustrated, tells a graphic story of the big event. All the leading motorcycles of the country had many entries, including fourteen Excelsiors, Harley-Davidsons, Daytons, Thors, Yales, Pops, etc. There were only six Indians entered and the first five winners were all Indian riders, coming in one, two, three, four, five, while the last Indian was No. 8, being only two machines behind. It proved beyond question that if you ride an Indian you can keep ahead. The prizes, \$500 in gold and a beautiful silver trophy, for first prize, and \$250 and \$125 in gold for second and third prizes, all attracted the best machines and best riders in the United States.
