The Wilmington, the fine new lumber carrier which Kruse & Banks have just completed for the Chas. Nelson Lumber Company, was launched at the shipyards at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The launching went off in fine shape, not an untoward incident interfering.

The new schooner was christened by Mrs. Greenough, wife of Inspector Greenough, who has supervised the construction of the vessel.

An audience of several hundred people had assembled for the launching. Owing to the rush to get the vessel ready for service, not much of a program was given.

The new vessel will be towed to San Francisco where her machinery will be installed. She will carry about 1,000,000 feet of lumber. She has no passenger accommodations.
