NEW PARCELS POST RULES NOW IN EFFECT

Postal Department is Simplifying and Improving the New Service —Fee on Insurance Cut.

The rule permitting the interchange of parcels post and regular postage stamps is now in effect. Regular stamps may be used on fourth-class mail matter and parcels post stamps on other mail matter.

Another order promulgated splits the insurance fee for parcels post packages. Heretofore a fee of 10 cents has been charged for insurance on each package, of whatever value, to a \$50 minimum. Under the new rule packages will be insured to the extent of \$25 for a fee of 5 cents and up to \$50 for 10 cents.

Front Street Problem.

Upon motion of Councilman Winkler last evening, the City Council decided to declare its intention of improving south Front street from Commercial avenue to Anderson avenue. This includes part of the Alliance warehouse and will raise immediately the question of whether the city's vacation of 135 feet of the street north of Anderson avenue a few years ago was legal. The property is held by the C. A. Smith company now.
