THE DISTINCTION AND THE DIFFERENCE.

THREE IS NO need of the red flag of anarchy in this country; there is no need for blatant vulgarity upon the rostrum. Essentially Americans are a conservative people and this fact has in a measure delayed the march of progress. It is true that the people of the country have not enjoyed all the opportunities which should have been theirs and that they have been plucked by plutocracy which has exploited them and frequently stolen their substance. And yet, generally speaking, they have been better off than any other people on top of the earth.

But we are in the midst of a great forward movement. The conditions which hampered us are being exposed and the day of equal privileges and equal rights are coming closer and closer. Any student of events can see the outcome. He can note its steady progress and realize that it is coming through peaceful and lawful means without the intervention of force or the horror of bloodshed. At no time in the whole history of the world has the outlook been so glorious and the prospect so gratifying.

All of this being true the average man and woman, striving toward equal rights and equal opportunities, are inclined to resent the work of those militant anarchists who would endanger this peaceful evolution through firebrand methods. The American people are a law-loving, law-abiding people. They will fight for their rights if there is no other way but that way is a last resort. They know that the great ruling agency in this country is plutocracy. They see on every side and every day evidence of that the most powerful how to it. They note its growth in strength and effectiveness and they realize that whatever they want or the country needs can be achieved through its agency. They note, too, that the blatherskite and trouble-breeder has no higher motive than to breed trouble. He is a man who works himself or who has the honorable ambition to establish for himself a decent place in the community and to accept the responsibility of rearing and educating a family. They note that he is simply "agin' everything and everybody except those engaged in the same destructive lines. He has nothing to suggest except to disrupt and tear down. Most often he is a foreigner without any knowledge of the country and who openly denounces the Government and its flag.

These sort of people deserve no consideration from any genuine American citizen. Neither they nor the newspaper trouble-breeders who back and sustain them have anything in common with the rest of the community nor any motive except the profit which comes from sensationalism pure, simple and unjustified.

Every community is chary about restrictions to free speech. It is this these people presume upon. Taking free speech for granted they indulge in license, they use openly in public addresses the language of the gutter and the brothel and they indulge in headlong denunciations of the Government and spit upon the flag under which they are living and which is about the only flag that would give them an asylum. So far has this been carried that the decent people of every community have grown tired of it. They see no reason why these emblems which they hold sacred should be spewed upon by a lot of irresponsible blatherskites. They have reached the point when they will no longer stand it.—Portland Telegram.

PROPOSALS FOR WATER HYDRANTS.

The Fire and Water Committee of the Common Council of the City of Marshfield will receive proposals for the purchase of eight (8) fire hydrants for immediate delivery, proposals to be received up till and including the 11th day of August, 1913.

The bidder is to quote prices f. o. b. Marshfield, Portland or San Francisco and date of delivery must be guaranteed. Bidders are to submit design of hydrant proposed to be furnished but to comply with the following specifications: 6-inch connection to water mains, two 2½-inch hose nozzles, one 5-inch steamer nozzle, three (3) foot bury (three feet from top of water main to top of curb), eighteen inches clearance between lowest valve stem and top of curb line to admit of proper space for manipulation of wrenches.
