TO STRAIGHTEN COQUILLE ROAD

Highway to Parallel Railroad as Soon as Funds are Available.

Plans to take some of the kinks and curves out of the county road between Marshfield and Coquille are being made and it is possible that something may be done towards relocating the crooked part of the highway altogether. Road Supervisor Norton of the Marshfield Road District stated today that a new road has been surveyed to parallel the railroad track and that it is to be put through as soon as the county can spare the money. Most of the crooked road is in Taylor Sigin's district and there is not sufficient money raised in that district to do the work without aid from the county as a whole.

Bunker Hill Road.
Mr. Norton says they are making good progress with the hard surface work in the Bunker Hill and Bay Park road. They are hard surfacing all the fills there and between a half-mile and three-quarters of a mile. The excavations and solid roadway will be planked. Ten inches of rock is being put on for a base, the rock being shipped from Coquille, then two inches of fine rock with hot bitumen and two inches of rock screenings for a wearing service.

T. W. McCloskey of Norway, has brought the county road roller here and is rolling the road.

NEWSPAPERMAN VISITS HERE

BEN LAWRENCE, NOW HEAD OF INDIANA NEWSPAPER SYNDICATE, AND WIFE, SPEND VACATION AT HIS OLD HOME.

Ben Lawrence, now head of one of the big newspaper syndicates in the United States, was in Marshfield today in company with his wife, E. C. Johnson and wife and Mrs. Drain, having motored over from Coquille, where he is visiting his father, J. S. Lawrence. Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence are spending a couple of weeks here while he is taking his annual vacation.

Mr. Lawrence was for some time managing editor of the Indianapolis Star and later was advanced to head of the syndicate which publishes three large dailies in the Indiana field. Their Indianapolis paper has a daily circulation of 50,000. His advancement in the newspaper game has been little short of phenomenal and is a source of gratification to his many Coos County friends.

Mr. Johnson while here today said that the lumber market was still dragging. They have not been able to do anything about taking over the defunct Coquille mill, owing to the litigation in which it is involved.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 25.—A desperate encounter between Miss Leona Perkins, of St. Helens, Or., with a large eagle at sea was described by passengers aboard the steamer Merced in port here. Miss Perkins not only routed the bird after it had first attacked a child on deck, but later brought it down from a mast head with a rifle bullet.
