PICNIC PROVES
GREAT SUCCESS

Sons of Norway Have an Ideal Day and a Good Crowd.

A good crowd, good music, a beautiful day, and plenty of entertainment were component parts in a most enjoyable and successful picnic given by the Sons of Norway yesterday. Music, dancing and athletic sports filled the hours with mirth and melody.

Between 500 and 600 people attended, and if there was one who didn't have a good time he couldn't be found by Levi Smith with a search warrant, and Levi is some Sherlock Holmes when it comes to searching.

The steamer Alert left early with a large party accompanied by the Coos Bay Concert band and carried the flag of Norway and "Old Glory." The picnicers were given a very pretty exhibition flight by the Gorst & King hydroplane. Claude Tucker of the band missed the boat and took the hydroplane, which passed over the Alert like a great bird, and alighted in the river above the creamery and landed Tucker on one of the boom logs where he was picked up by the steamer a few minutes later. It was an ideal spot, an ideal day, and an ideal picnic.

Splendid music and a good platform proved an irresistible attraction for many and all afternoon and evening there was a crowd of merry dancers. In the athletic events there were three foot races, a 100 and 200 yard dash for men and a 50 yard dash for ladies.
