TRIED TO KILL HIS SISTER

LIBERTY HAINES OF ECKLEY, ARRESTED AT MYRTLE POINT FOR MURDEROUS ASSAULT ON RELATIVE IN CURRY COUNTY.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "Marshal J. C. Brown arrested Liberty Haines of Eckley shortly after he had arrived in town. The arrest was made at the request of Sheriff Bailey of Curry county. Haines, it seems, has been acting in an irresponsible manner for some time and last Thursday went to the home of his sister, Mrs. C. H. Hampton, near Eckley, and made a violent attack on her with the avowed intention, it is said, of killing her. He was only prevented from carrying out his purpose by the intervention of Mr. Hampton, who was attracted by his wife's screams from the field in which he was working.

"Haines fled from the house and started horseback toward this city, Hampton, fearing the man might return and do more violence, phoned the authorities at Gold Beach and secured a warrant for him, charging lunacy.

"Deputy Sheriff Russell, who had hastened to the Hampton place when word of the trouble reached Gold Beach, came to Myrtle Point and secured Haines Friday afternoon, taking him to Coquille, where he will be examined as to his sanity before Judge Hall Friday. The expense of the case will be charged to Curry county, as all the parties concerned are residents of that county."

MEETS EX-WIFE NOW ON STAGE

N. S. Mattson. Said to be From Marshfield. Has Unusual Portland Experience.

The following from the Portland Oregonian will be of interest on the Bay as the claim is made that N. S. Mattson is employed by the C. A. Smith company in Marshfield: "Hello, Sturie." "Hello—why, Emma; hello, hello."

"The crowd at Sixth and Washington continued to pass on its hungry way about 5:30 o'clock last night, unmindful that a marital rift between two well-known persons was being bridged for a few minutes.

"It was Emma Carus, this week appearing at the Pantages and her one-time husband, N. S. (Sturie) Mattson. Emma Carus is an actress, a Broadway favorite. Sturie Mattson is the man who went from a millionaire's life on Wall street to a hobo's berth in a trans-continental railroad freight car in almost less time than it takes to tell it.

"Although the divorce court had done its work seven years ago or more, Sturie Mattson was jubilant over the fleeing interview with his former mate. Emma Carus refused to talk of it last night, and denied that she had accepted Mr. Mattson's invitation to dinner. Mr. Mattson declared the two went to the Hotel Portland, where for the first time since the wedding supper in New York 12 years ago, they broke bread under the same roof.

"But we didn't have dinner together," said Miss Carus last night as she dismissed the interviewer. "Yes, we had a good chat about old times when we were at dinner," said Mr. Mattson, a little while before.

"Anyway, it was a long enough interview for Miss Carus and Mr. Mattson to recall Mr. Mattson's sudden exit from Yale University one day following his attendance at a vaudeville show in New Haven, when he saw Emma Carus. The next day he went to New York, introduced himself and soon they were married. Then the curtain is drawn.

"Mr. Mattson also recalled for a minute the fleeing he received in Wall street one day after he had inherited a million and more from his father, who was the late Colonel H. Mattson, of Minneapolis, one-time Secretary of State of Minnesota and Consul-General at Calcutta under President Garfield. How he took to the rods and the freight cars when his money was gone and finally came to Oregon and got a job from a friend of the family, C. A. Smith, and settled down, were all bits of chronological chit-chat, according to Mattson.

"Today Sturie Mattson is one of the employees of the C. A. Smith Lumber Company at Marshfield. His ex-wife is entertaining theatre-goers with her songs and quips. Mattson says they are still good friends. Miss Carus doesn't say."

TWO KILLED AT INITIATION.
