

## PARCEL POST BOAT SERVICE

Propose to Change it From Mail to Steamer During the Winter Months.

Postmaster W. B. Curtis today received the following self-explanatory letter from S. H. Morse, Post-office Inspector of this district:

"I have just received a case for investigation, which contemplates sending parcel post matter for Marshfield, Oregon, via Portland, Oregon, and thence by boat to Marshfield.

"This change is planned in order to deliver parcel post matter in better shape than if transported by stage from Roseburg, although there might be more time consumed in transit.

"Please give me your opinion in regard to such a change, and how the patrons of your office will regard same.

"Any information you can furnish on this subject will be appreciated."

### For Winter Months.

The proposed arrangement is simply for the winter months when the mail has to be handled on pack-horses. Contractor Barnard says it will simply be impossible for him to arrange to carry the parcel post business in addition to the regular mail.

At present, the parcel post business averages between 400 and 500 pounds per day and owing to the bulky packages is more difficult to handle than mail. Even then, it would be difficult to prevent the packages becoming crushed and water-soaked.

While it might mean a few days' delay to have the parcel post come by boat, Postmaster Curtis says that it looks to him as though it would be the best way out of it. Anyway the parcel post service by boat would be just as good as could be obtained by express.

Mr. Curtis is anxious to secure the expression of as many as possible relative to the proposed change.
