## WILL GO WHERE AUTOS ARE MADE

### Goodroads Goodrum Leaves Next Week for Detroit on Business.

Goodroads Goodrum leaves next Monday on an extended trip to Detroit to investigate the automobile business and get a line on the 1914 models. In addition to getting the very latest information as to cars and equipment from the manufacturers, he expects to enlarge and perfect his plans for a still further improvement in his service department.

In discussing the purpose of his visit, Mr. Goodrum said: "I propose to get right at the heart of the auto business by visiting the factories where they are made. Besides visiting the places where they make Fords and Cadillacs, I also will see the other factories and if there is any better car made I am going to know it and I am also going to have it. It will also enable me to learn all the new improvements and latest ideas in the auto business. I am not going to wait until these are sent west next spring and summer by the factory representatives, but I am going to see them and get them and bring them back to Coos Bay as soon or sooner than they will have them in the other Coast cities."

"I also will make a thorough inspection of all the advance improvements in the Fourth Epoch of automobile development as shown in the new 1914 Cadillacs."

Mr. Goodrum will go East by way of the Canadian Pacific Railway and expects to make a brief vacation visit at Banff and other lake resorts on the way.
