DESERVED DISCHARGE.

THE board of public works in Kansas City has suspended an employee of the department for incivility to a citizen of the community who had asked information from the department.

The board will be commended far and wide. Nothing quite equals the kind of boorishness which finds expression in incivility in public office. That it is not practiced by the chiefs who must look to the people for endorsement, but emphasizes the execrable character of the offense on the part of the subordinates.

One of the incomprehensible and inconceivable mysteries of life is the tendency of humans to be discourteous. It is unfortunate that it must be tolerated at any turn of the road. There should be one answer for the churlish, ignorant, incompetent who is uncivil, in personality, contact or through the telephone, in public or private business, and that his instant discharge from the service he discharges.

THE I. W. W. ISSUE.

THE arrests last night were an issue that had to be met. Out of their own mouths the arrested agitators confess themselves as enemies of intelligent labor, enemies of state government, enemies of law, enemies of the flag, enemies of Christianity, enemies of peace and enemies of the republic itself. When men become threatening in their hatred of established order the law must be applied to them as to the boy who steals a loaf of bread for a starving family.

References by last night's speakers to the governor, mayor, police, sheriff and other lawful authorities were in terms of "white livered curs," "skunk," and "mental prostitutes," and "cockroaches," and "dirty curs," and "sinking fellows." Burns' parting remark before his arrest was, "We'll fly the red flag of anarchy over the marble palace, up there," meaning the Multnomah county courthouse.

These are the epithets of deluded men. They are from men who entertain the grotesque theory that they can destroy government. What is worse, they are misguided enough to believe the social order would be better off without government. When men are on the streets applauding such aspirations, it is an issue that must be met.

Most of the men arrested interfered in the parking house quarrel, not as co-workers, not as peace-makers, not as negotiators, but some of them as paid recruiting officers of the I. W. W. Their acts have been to promote trouble, to intensify anger and to encourage violence.

It is not the authorities alone that represent the recent acts of Burns, Schwab and the others. Every responsible labor organization in Portland must entertain similar resentment. Responsible workers oppose the I. W. W. because the latter's aim is to inflict damage upon property, to bring harm to those who employ workers and heap contempt upon those whose duty it is to enforce the law.

If the I. W. W. idea of destruction rather than construction is to prevail, we shall soon have no industry and no government, no wages and no property, no rights and no justice. Workers and employees of workers must have a common ground on which to meet, the I. W. W. to the contrary notwithstanding. Otherwise, peace is impossible and progress is impossible.

The I. W. W. is a labor organization so-called, but it sacrifices labor to lawlessness. It professes justice but refuses to arbitrate. It denounces war but never makes peace. It assails officers for preserving order, but counsels violence. It pretends to defend free speech, but teaches sedition and riot, and carries in its flabby hands no standard but license. How can public authority refuse to meet such an issue?

FRITCH PLANS
FAST VESSEL

Hopes to Interest Portland Capital in Steamer for Speedy Coast Trade.

J. Homer Fritch, veteran steamship man of San Francisco, left today for Portland where he will try and interest capital in a new fast passenger and freight boat between Portland and San Francisco to stop at Coos Bay and Eureka en route both ways. The new boat is now in service in Atlantic waters as a private vessel and his plan is to buy her and convert the upper decks into passenger staterooms. She is speedy and he says would make the run from San Francisco to Coos Bay in twenty hours. He plans to put her on a six-day schedule between San Francisco and Portland, stopping at Coos Bay and Eureka. She will be primarily a passenger boat, but will carry high-class freight, fruits and vegetables, etc.

NEW BOAT ON
FAST SCHEDULE

Steamer laqua Sails This Afternoon for San Francisco—Seven-day Schedule.

The steamer laqua sailed this afternoon for San Francisco with passengers and freight and will run on a regular schedule between here and San Francisco. She has not been remodelled and rebuilt yet, as was reported, but will be as soon as it is found there is sufficient trade to keep her on the Coos Bay-San Francisco run. She has accommodations for about twenty-five first class passengers, but this can be greatly increased. She is operated by the West Coast Transportation Company of Eureka and is now handling business for W. S. Scammel. It is planned to have her on a regular seven-day schedule, leaving San Francisco every Wednesday in a week or so. She is speedy, having made the run here from San Francisco in thirty-seven hours.

Capt. A. Self, a former Coquille river boy, is in command of the laqua. This is his first trip to Coos Bay as master of a vessel. The laqua had a cargo of milk, box shooks, etc., outgoing.
