**Bar Dredge.**—A Portland paper says that G. C. Westervelt, U. S. naval constructor, in charge of supervision of the building of the bar dredge P. S. Michie at Seattle, conferred with Major Morrow about the craft last week. He reports the Michie about 89 per cent completed and that she should be ready for service on the Coos Bay bar by the latter part of October or early in November.

**Easy Here.**—It is understood that U. S. District Attorney Reames is gathering information relative to the operations of land locators in Coos County with a view to including some from here in the crusade which he will launch against the alleged graft at the October term of Federal Court. It is said that some parties operating both at Portland and on Coos Bay in these entries are the ones first called to his attention.

**Oppose Hawley.**—In Saturday evening's issue of the Portland Telegram there appeared an article in which Senator George Neuner, of Roseburg, was mentioned as a probable candidate for Congress in opposition to W. C. Hawley, at the general election to be held in November, 1914. When interviewed this morning Senator Neuner would neither confirm nor deny the truth of the statement.—Roseburg News.

**Damage Suit Transferred.**—A Portland paper says: "The damage suit of Mrs. Kate Buck of Marshfield against the C. A. Smith Lumber & Manufacturing company, R. K. Booth and George Gettins, originally brought in Coos County, was transferred to the Federal Court this morning by the defendants." Mrs. Buck seeks \$50,000 damages for injuries caused, she alleged, by a tramcar operated by the company from its mill to the yards, resulting in her permanent mental and physical disability. It is declared.

**Visit Curry County.**—Leland Brown, son of District Attorney and Mrs. George M. Brown, and Harold Bellows, left for the Culver ranch, in Curry County, this morning, where they will spend several weeks enjoying their annual outing. The boys are making the trip on horses and are well armed. Following their arrival in Curry County they will spend a few days in the hills hunting deer and other game. Mr. Brown will join them about the date of the

opening of the Circuit Court in Curry County.—Roseburg News.

**Box Factory Deal.**—C. H. Marsh, right of way agent for the Southern Pacific, stated this afternoon that the deal for the purchase of the box factory at North Bend by the railway seemed to be closed. It had been reported around that the deal had not been made but all of the principals confirm the story of the sale.

**Insurance Men Here.**—Three well known general fire insurance agents are here from Portland looking after their Coos Bay agencies. One is Harvey Wells of the German-American, another is J. F. R. Webber and the third is W. H. Raymond, of the Queen. Mr. Wells, who has had a hoodo following him on most of his trips to the Bay, escaped it this time and came in without accident. Mr. Raymond insists that he scared the hoodo away and Dr. Toye, who has known the latter for twenty years, says that there is no doubt but that Raymond could do this—and more.

**News of Father's Death.**—C. E. Nicholson is in receipt of a cable conveying the sad news of the death of his father, E. Nicholson, at Ville an Roy, in the Isle of Guernsey, on Sunday. Although 86 years old, Mr. Nicholson was hale and hearty and the news of his death came as a shock. This was accentuated by the fact that C. E. Nicholson had just received a letter from him in which he stated he was enjoying his unusual health and he scarcely finished reading the letter when the messenger boy arrived with the cablegram announcing his death.
