Coos Bay Continues to Furnish Bulk of Receipts at San Francisco Market.

Coos Bay continues to be the principal source of supply for the San Francisco lumber market and during the last two weeks of July landed considerably more there than any other point. A skiff was launched and sailed about three miles which picked the man up after he had been in the water about 45 minutes. He was none the worse for his experience."
