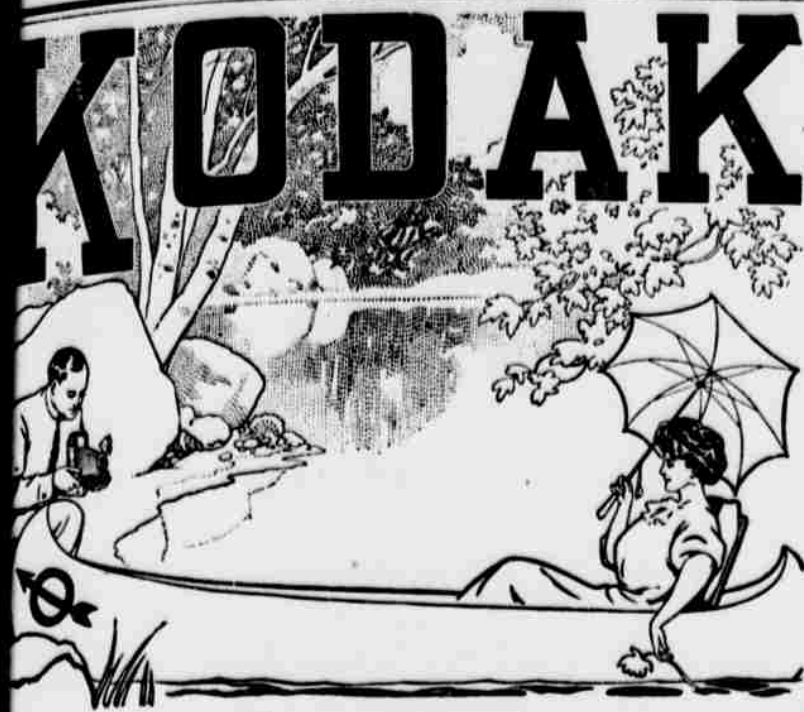

Conrad of the Coos County Fire Patrol had a number of men sent there to aid in checking the blaze. This is the first fire of consequence this season.

Settle Case.—City Attorney Mullen, of North Bend, and a committee of the North Bend Council and members of the Coos Bay Water Company, have settled the water company's case against North Bend for hydrant rental. The Council refused to pay the bill, alleging it was too high for the service rendered. The settlement was effected by the company accepting seventy-five per cent of their claim for about \$1000 and not charging interest.
