SEA MONSTER KILLED.

Crawls Up Rocks at Heceta After Woman and Child.

Mrs. C. L. Hansen, wife of the lightkeeper at Heceta lighthouse, had a short distance above Florence, had an exciting experience with a 16-foot squid.

Mrs. Hansen was down on the rocks at low tide when her little daughter exclaimed, "Oh! mamma, look at the man!" Turning, Mrs. Hansen discovered the squid half on the rock but a few yards away. Several of the long tentacles were reaching further, while the ugly head with the parrot-like beak was well out of the water. The huge goggle eyes were fixed upon the two people. Mrs. Hansen screamed to her husband and the squid slipped back into the water as he approached. It could be plainly seen, however, along the rock. Mrs. Hansen then called Fred Dero, the assistant keeper, and with a long gaff hook and grappling rakes the two men succeeded in landing and killing the monster.

The tentacles were seven feet long and the body 28 inches, making it over 16 feet from tip to tip. The body proper was over six feet long and of mottled brown color. It had a diamond shaped tail about 27 inches across.

A squid is much like the more common octopus or devil fish, except for the long body and heavy beak. This one could easily have overpowered the two men and they had to use extreme care to keep out of reach of the tentacles. Even when it was nearly dead the adhesive power in the tentacles was strong enough to hold a man's arm down.
