PLAN TO FILL
SO. MARSHFIELD

Property Owners Will Have to Pay for Fill—Port Commission Meeting.

At a meeting of the Port of Coos Bay Commission this morning, it was decided that the residents of South Marshfield and Railroad Addition should be given the dredgings from the Bay to fill their property with if they will pay the expense of handling the shore pipe. It is figured that the dredge will be able to pump back to the vicinity of Seventh street, where it is needed that far, and to practically fill all of the Railroad Addition and as far north as Mill Slough. Unless the property owners arrange to pay the expense of handling the shore pipe, the Port Commission will probably have the dredge pump the dredgings over to the east side of the channel where no bulkhead will be required and there will be practically no expense in handling the shore pipe.

It is expected to have the dredge Seattle working by August 14. She will start in opposite North Bend and begin on the 400,000 yard fill of the Southern Pacific grounds. The Southern Pacific will pay about \$18,000 of the expense of this dredging. The Seattle will be worked three shifts daily and will be able to throw an immense amount of dirt, being considerably larger than the Dredge Oregon which operated here last.

To Buy Property.

J. W. Bennett and Geo. W. Loggie and the owners of block 64, have offered to sell it to the Port Commission for \$28,000, same to be used as a public dock. This is at the rate of \$2,000 per lot. It joins the present Port Commission property which has a waterfrontage of 375 feet and this would bring the water frontage up to about 700 feet for public dock purposes.

The Port Commission thought the price asked was a little stiff and instructed Sec. Sengstacken to negotiate with them. Another problem is the raising of funds to acquire the property as the present dredging project will take practically all the surplus funds of the Commission. In some ways, the property appealed to the Port as it is about midway between North Bend and Marshfield so that it would serve both towns.

The Port Commission instructed the Secretary to notify the Union Oil Company that the Port would build a dock and warehouse for them for \$75 per month rental and twenty cents per ton wharfage on the incoming freight.

W. E. Homme and C. I. Reigard brought up the Cooson project again. They asked for \$250 to dredge a channel over to where Mr. Homme and others will build a wharf. The Commission referred it to the Port engineer to report on, claiming that the expense will exceed the \$250 estimate.
