struct New Episcopal Edifice
—Close Bidding.

The vestry board of the Episcopal Church met last evening to open bids for the new church which is to be located at the corner of Fourth street and Market avenue. The following parties submitted bids: Hibarger & Son, Ladd & Harris, J. F. Telander, Wright & Bentley. Hibarger & Son were found to be the lowest bidders for the structurally completed church, their figure being \$8,834, and this was closely followed by Ladd & Harris, at \$8,967. The contract will be entered into with the successful bidders at an early date and the work rushed through to completion before the rainy season begins. The figures of the lowest bidders were very gratifying to the board.
