SAYS OUTLOOK IN EAST GOOD

R. A. Copple Returns From Eastern Trip—Intense Hot Weather Damages Corn.

That the outlook in the East is a decided improvement in business conditions is the opinion of R. A. Copple, who has just returned from a month's trip to New York. He says there is the usual summer vacation halt and then the importers have been holding back on account of the tariff situation. There is plenty of money, but the uncertainty about the currency legislation has delayed matters some. Despite these temporary checks, Mr. Copple says there is a general buoyant feeling as to the future.

He encountered some very hot weather during his trip. In St. Louis last Wednesday, he says he suffered more from the heat than any place he has ever been. A dry hot wind was blowing and it was almost suffocating. In Nebraska and Kansas, the corn crop looks as though it was gone beyond recall. In Illinois and Ohio, corn was not so bad.

ROTNOR HOME FROM OUTING

Spent Month With Family at Coronado Beach—San Diego Most Prosperous City.

Geo. Rotnor, manager of the Woolen Mill Store, arrived home last evening from a month's stay in California, most of the time being spent with his family at Coronado, the tented city across the Bay from San Diego. He had a most delightful trip there. On his return to San Francisco, he suffered a slight illness and has not fully recovered from an attack of fever.

Mr. Rotnor reports that San Diego is apparently the most prosperous city in California. There is a vast amount of building going on there and he says they have made greater progress with their exposition buildings than has San Francisco. It was very hot in Los Angeles, San Francisco was apparently rather quiet.

Mr. Rotnor came home via Roseburg and Myrtle Point and reports that four autos were required to bring in the passengers last night.

WILL PATROL ALL OF TOWN

Council Decides on Better Po- lice and Fire Protection for West and South.

At a meeting of the Marshfield City Council last evening it was decided to have the West Marshfield and South Marshfield residence districts patrolled every night for fire and police protection. Heretofore the police have been patrolling only as far west as Fourth street and as far south as Elrod, but the Council ordered last evening that a policeman should be assigned to patrol the district west of Fourth and south of Commercial, South Marshfield and Railroad Addition. The patrol is to continue from 7 o'clock in the evening until 6 in the morning.

The matter was favorably reported by Councilman Winkler and Albrecht in response to the petition of John Bear and others for better police protection for that section of the City.

They also reported in favor of installing at least two telephone booths one at Tenth and Central and one in Railroad Addition, so that the patrolman could report to headquarters. Other phone booths may be installed. There was considerable discussion about the number of these required, and how they should be arranged so that anyone could turn in an alarm from them. Some thought that if they were left open, people in the neighborhood might use them for other purposes. The telephone company agrees to give free service, the City simply paying the cost of installation.

The new patrolman is to be one of the present officers, no increase in the force being required.
