NEW MINE IS NEARLY DONE

Supt. Hennessey to Have Fine
Shaft on Isthmus Inlet in
Full Operation Soon.

The Smith-Powers mine on Isthmus Inlet in about a week will be operating with electricity and will soon be supplying coal at its full capacity for the time being. J. D. Mercey, who is in charge of the construction of the high power line from the electric plant at the Smith mill to the mine, expects to have the line completed by next Tuesday, and by a week from Monday all the connections should be completed, so that the mine will be in full operation. Most of the machinery has been installed, but they are being somewhat delayed by the non-arrival of the controller of the big electric hoist. This may reach here within the next few weeks. If it does not, a temporary one will be rigged up.

Superintendent Hennessey expects to be taking out on an average of 250 tons of coal per day. At present he has been unable to take the coal out of the mine as fast as it is mined owing to the steam hoist being inadequate.

The coal is proving of even better grade than they expected. The mine is probably one of the best opened that has ever been sunk in along the Coast. White cedar has been used in the timbering and will last a century. The electric equipment is of the latest type.

While no definite arrangements have been made yet as to the marketing of the coal, no trouble will be encountered on this score. Considerable of it will probably be shipped to San Francisco and will probably be handled in sacks to save loss in handling.
