POSTPONE MEETING

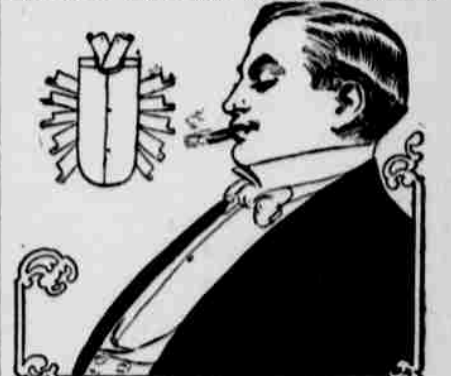
