Sprained Ankle.—Mr. and Mrs.

one day last week. He returned

Keep Postoffice.—It is stated that
a movement has been started by
some of the Front street property
owners to try and retain the Post-
office near its present location.
Nothing definite has been done so
far. Whether the new Hutcheson
block could be obtained is not cer-
tain, but the Government would not
pay anywhere near the rent they
desire and a considerable sum
would have to be raised by those
in the vicinity.

down at Coquille this afternoon.
