"All models will have metal bodies and these are constructed on entirely new lines, adding to the beauty of appearance. The cushions are deep and of the Turkish variety, being luxuriously comfortable. All of the touring car bodies will be in five passenger, and built considerably larger, but lighter than formerly.

"Then there is the famous Buick overhead valve motor," and here Mr. Tower grew more enthusiastic. And, by the way, all touring cars will be equipped with gasoline tanks at the rear, and air pressure pumps, under pressure from the crank case to force the gasoline from the tank to the carburetor.

"The new roadster models will carry an enclosed boat at the rear and all models will have the three-quarter floating rear axle.

"All of the cars will be equipped with tops, dust-hoods, clear-vision wind shields, tire-irons, one extra rim, speedometer and the regular equipment similar to this year."

"There will be six models of pleasure cars built by Buick the coming season, but there is one—the 6-cylinder Roadster and Touring car that is a remarkable value—it is a marvel of modern mechanism and luxury, will have a wheel base of 130 inches, and road clearance of 12 inches, 36x1½ tires and weighs complete 3425 pounds. These cars will sell for \$2160 delivered in Coos County, and I can honestly say there is nothing approaching them in value and appearance.
