WHAT PTOMAIN POISONING IS

A New York Reader of The Times Writes Interestingly on Subject.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14, 1913.

Editor The Times:

An article in the Times of July 31, gives an account of the death of Miss Viola Lattin, caused by ptomaine poisoning.

I believe no better work can be done by the press than to warn the public of the danger existing from partaking of foods not properly preserved and the necessity of using canned goods as soon as possible after opening the can.

Scientific experiments have determined time and time again that numerous articles of food when not kept in a hygienic condition readily deteriorate so as to become poisonous substances.

The formation of ptomaine generally, although not always, accompanies putrefaction, therefore, great care should be taken that meat, fish, fowl, oysters, canned goods, etc. are eaten only when in good condition. It is not economy to partake of food when putrefaction has commenced.

Food can be kept in a hygienic condition either by heat or refrigeration by the exclusion of air, or by the application of substances which on account of their antiseptic properties, prevent the growth of poisonous germs.

Statistics show that since the enactment of the Pure Food Law there have been 38,866 cases of ptomaine poisoning, 1,623 of which have been fatal. It is certainly distressing to think of this vast number of persons becoming ill and of so many innocent lives lost merely because food products are not preserved so as to keep them in a hygienic condition until consumed. Such distressing conditions will continue to prevail as long as consumers do not heed the warning of the danger existing in consuming foods not kept in a hygienic condition.

CANNED BEEF SOARS BECAUSE OF DROUTH

Wholesale Price is Already Double What It Was a Few Years Ago.

Corned beef, pound tins, per dozen, eight years ago . . . \$1.15
Same thing now . . . 2.30
Canned roast beef, pound tins, eight years ago . . . 1.15
Same thing now . . . 2.30
Chipped beef, tins or glasses, eight years ago . . . 1.15
Same thing now . . . 1.70
Lunch tongue, pound tins, eight years ago, dozen . . . 1.50
Same thing now . . . 2.15

There is the canned beef situation as it now confronts the consumer, says a Portland paper. The prices named are the wholesale quotations, and in some lines are exactly double the figures at which the commodities named were available eight years ago. Retail quotations, of course, are well above the figures given.

And there is every reason for the belief that a further increase in the cost of practically everything in the canned beef line will be tacked on in the near future, for the corn crop in the Middle West, upon which the beef producers largely depend, is said to be fast going to the bad as a result of the extremely dry weather in the cereal belt the past few weeks.

The jobbers say that it is difficult now, and is steadily growing more difficult, to get orders for canned beef filled at the great packing centers of the country. The supply, even now, is short and must inevitably be shorter as the season advances, and with the curtailment in the supply, higher prices all around are counted a certainty.
