OLD PIONEER VISITS HERE

MRS. MARY E. GLENN, OF BAKERSFIELD, CALIFORNIA, RECALLS DETAILS OF TRIP ACROSS PLAINS IN 1854.

John D. and James C. Jones, of the Coos Bay Steam Laundry are enjoying a visit from their grandmother, Mrs. Mary E. Glenn, who is here with her great-grandson, Cecil Jones, from Bakersfield, California. She is an old pioneer of California, crossing the plains in 1854 from Waco, Texas, with her father, John Dunlap. There were about 100 families in the wagon train, of which John Dunlap was the leader. He was a great fancier of blooded stock and had with him 500 head of American horses and 1000 head of cattle. Mrs. Glenn recalls the many remarks of admiration made regarding these horses, for they were beautiful animals and had never been worked. They took with them 100 men whom she boarded for their help with the stock. She remembers the dry stretch of prairies when they had not had water for many, many days, until they reached the Rio Grande River, where the almost famished cattle struggled to get to the water, but the horsemen constantly kept feeding them back to keep them from drowning. At it was, they left a trail of dead animals almost all the way.

They did not encounter any Indians until they reached what is now known as Tombstone, Arizona. They had made camp, keeping the cattle in the enclosure made by the wagons, but turning the horses out to graze, when the Indians early one morning made a raid on them, killing the vaquero, Jim Houston,

whom they buried there, placing a large stone to mark his grave. This stone was the origin of the name of Tombstone. There was another wagon train camped about one mile distant. From these the Indians stole all their cattle, leaving them only their wagons and supplies. This made it necessary for both trains to break steers to drive. John Dunlap supplied both trains with steers. Many amusing incidents occurred while breaking them to drive. They remained camped there, getting up a party to scour the country for the Indians and horses, killing sixty Indians, but not a sight did they get of a single stolen horse. Here they lost one man, a Mexican, who had joined the party of scouts as guide. His death would not have occurred had not his bridle broken. The scouts, however, took all the cattle the Indians had, giving them to the widow of the dead scout.

They then came on to California, camping at Warner's Hot Springs, San Diego County. Then on to Los Angeles County, to El Monte. From there the cattle were sent on to Tulare and Visalia, where John C. Reed took charge of them. Then to Kern County in Linn's Valley. After that to San Bernardino, where John Dunlap purchased the Ukiah Ranch, comprising nearly 1000 acres. This ranch was afterwards sold for several hundred thousand dollars.

To Mrs. Glenn's knowledge, of those who were in the train there are still living Dr. and Mrs. Barton, of San Bernardino; Mrs. Bright, of Tehachapi; Sarah Glenn, of Visalia, Salena Johnson, of Santa Cruz; Mrs. Tobias Minter, of Bakersfield; her brother, James E. Huston, and Pierce Dunlap, and her sister, Jennie Bowler, of Los Angeles. They were nine months crossing the plains.

Tom Stora, who spent his vacation visiting friends in Portland, returned last week but did not bring a bride with him as it was rumored he would.

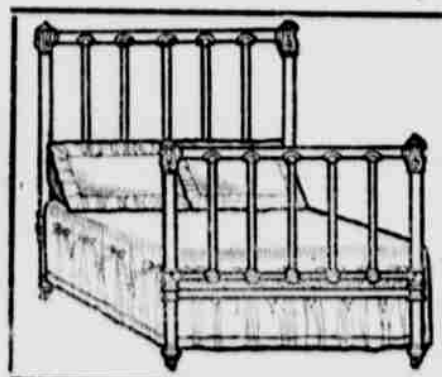
Mrs. John Freeland and children, Clifford and Mildred, left yesterday to visit relatives on North Bend.
