RAILWAY TO ALASKA.

Rep. Johnson, of Washington, Wants Direct Line.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 27.—A joint resolution requesting President Wilson to negotiate connections between the United States and Alaska was introduced by Representative Johnson of Washington. The preamble sets forth that if necessary it is to have such a railroad to enable the Army, with the consent of Canada, to undertake the defense of Alaska.

SURVEYING HOMESTEAD LANDS

Newly Opened Forest Reserve on Siuslaw Scene of Activity.

H. E. Smith, Government surveyor, at work in the Siuslaw reserve with two other engineers inspecting and surveying the homesteads which have been filed in the newly opened forest, yesterday moved his camp into the Smith River territory near Gardiner. His crew consists of two men. At present three surveyors are at this work in the reserve. J. E. Grubbe, of Medford, a week ago established camp in the Alsea district, dividing the crew of Asher Ireland, who has taken the territory to the north.

These three surveyors have on hand the huge task of surveying and inspecting the 500 applications for homesteads in the Siuslaw reserve, the applicants for which have been flooding the local office in Eugene ever since the opening of the forest to homestead entry by Chief Forester Graves a month ago.

The surveyors must cover every 10 acres in the prospective homestead, and determine that none of the land is more valuable for timber than for agricultural purposes. The work is an enormous task, and homesteaders all through the reserve, from Tillamook to Marshfield, are eagerly waiting for news of the surveyors in this districts.—Eugene Register.

REPORT THAT MARSHFIELD MAN IN THE EAST WILL GO TO WASHINGTON TO URGE CLOSING OF MILL SLOUGH—POLITICAL MATTERS.

OREGON ROAD
EXPERT HERE

State Engineer H. L. Bowlby Makes Tour of Inspection With Commissioners.

H. L. Bowlby, Oregon State Highway Engineer, arrived here last evening via Allegany to inspect the principal roads of Coos County and offer what advice and suggestions he could for the County Commissioners and County Road Supervisor. He is simply on a tour of inspection to see the highways and in case Coos County decides to go ahead and bond and avail itself of state aid to be in a position to handle it.

Mr. Bowlby was met here by County Road Supervisor P. M. Hall-Lewis, Commissioners Taylor, Dement and Geo. Armstrong. He arrived late last evening and this morning the party and Judge Hall and City Engineer Buckingham made an auto trip to Shore Acres and returned at noon. The party with the exception of Mr. Buckingham proceeded immediately to Coquille and will go to Bandon and tomorrow will finish the trip to the Douglas County Line. Mr. Bowlby returning via Roseburg. The trip will take him over the principal part of the trunk lines of highway in the County where it is proposed to embrace in the first roads to be built under the bonding plan.

Mr. Bowlby was formerly State Highway Commissioner of Oregon, was a member of the Engineer Faculty of the Oregon Agricultural College and is a thorough and practical man. He was reticent about discussing the means of improving roads here until he saw and studied them, the roads in the different sections of the State varying owing to the climatic and soil conditions. He said that the proposal to use oil on the dirt roads to lay the dust in summer time here was not practicable because, while it might settle the dust, it would make them that much worse in the winter time.

The Eastport mine resumed work last Monday.

Fresh chinook salmon in the market at fifty cents each.

The schooner Mose sailed from San Francisco for the Coquille River last Thursday.

A school teacher is wanted at Eastport. Apply to Housley, Malarky and Barker, directors.

Mr. Garfield, of Istimus Slough, killed three bears last Saturday, and it was not a first class bear day either.

The many friends of S. S. Bailey and family will be glad to hear that they returned to the Bay by the Telfair last Saturday.

Louis Lobree returned to this place on the last trip of the Gussie Telfair, from San Francisco, where he has been during the last two months.

Marshfield has a population of 625. It has eleven places where whiskey can be bought. It has no church building. It has no public school house. It casts a large Republican majority.

Archbishop Seghers will hold divine services on Sunday, August 29, 1880, at Newport, and Sunday, September 5, 1880, at Ellensburg. He will visit Bandon on his return from Ellensburg.

Mr. Lieberman, who is well and favorably known on the Bay came up on the last trip of the Gussie Telfair. Mr. Lieberman is a good trader and a jolly fellow, but he always wants "value received." Cumtux?

Thirty thousand tons of earth have been used in constructing the embankment along the track to the

Newport mine, and upwards of two hundred acres of marsh land have been reclaimed. It is the intention of the proprietors, Messrs. Flanagan & Mann, to extend the road till it reaches the main channel near this place.

Mrs. Yoakam, of Coos River, aided by her daughter and one hired man, carries on her farm, and she has this summer already, put down 1600 pounds of butter for which she expects to realize 50 cents per pound in the winter. Besides sufficient hay for her stock she has forty tons to sell, for which the adjacent logging camps will furnish a ready market. There are few men farmers who can make a better showing.

Willie H. Barkiss, aged three years and eight months, son of W. Barkiss, who lives on Coos River near Mr. Landrith's, fell off the wharf at his father's landing last Friday evening and was drowned. It appears that in falling the little fellow's head struck a boat, which in a measure accounts for the body not coming to the surface till it was found two hours afterwards. The father is a good swimmer and made several attempts to find the body shortly after the accident.

Slyvester Scott, a gentleman from Scotland, brought twelve trained dogs to hunt bear, from San Francisco, by the steamer Arcata, which arrived last Sunday. Mr. Scott, who is accompanied by his brother and Major Tower, spent several months fishing and shooting on the Bay and Ten Mile Lake this year, and believing bear to be plentiful, he made a trip to San Francisco for dogs. The gentlemen are purely pleasure seekers and it is to be hoped they will be successful, especially as bear are very troublesome to the settlers on Ten Mile.
