BOWLBY PAID COOS TRIBUTE

STATE ENGINEER APPROVED
DIRT ROADS AND PROPOSED
NEW ROAD PLANS—DOUGLAS
DELAYS ACTION ON MYRTLE
POINT ROAD.

Judge John F. Hall and County Roadmaster P. M. Hall-Lewis returned this afternoon from Roseburg, to which place they accompanied State Highway Engineer Bowlby after an inspection trip over the Coos County roads. Mr. Bowlby expects to return here later. Before leaving, he complimented them on the condition of the dirt roads in Coos County, saying they were boulevards in comparison with some he had seen in this state. He also approved the grades and profiles of the new road from Myrtle Point, with the changes suggested by Hall-Lewis. Mr. Bowlby said the rock near Myrtle Point was good for road making.

At Roseburg the party conferred with the Douglas County Commissioners as to what they proposed to do with the road to Myrtle Point. They would not make any statement before their meeting in September when their County Roadmaster is to make a report to them. They have surveyed two miles of the road so far.

En route home, they made the trip from Roseburg in about seven hours running time.
