LIND STAYS AT VERA CRUZ; ALL QUIET IN OLD MEXICO

President Wilson and Sec. Bryan Away From Washington Indicating Quiet.

UNITED STATES PLAYS WAITING GAME THERE

Think That Next Few Days Will Bring Favorable Developments From Huerta.

(By Associated Press to Cooz Bay Times.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 30.—The Mexican situation was unchanged today. John Lind, President Wilson's personal envoy, was still at Vera Cruz, and no address of his plans had come to Washington. Secretary Bryan, on returning to town for two hours on an overnight lecture tour, left on another, to return tomorrow.
Secretary Taft left for the week-end with his family in New Jersey. With the President at the summer capital at Cornish, arrangements were made to transfer any important developments to him there. Bryan, after receiving a message from Lind, declared the situation unchanged. Lind is acting on his own discretion about returning to Mexico City. Indications pointed to the view that the policy for the next few days will be a waiting one. A strict neutrality is enforced and Americans are urged to leave Mexico. Those who take that view point to President Wilson's declaration to Congress in his address "that the actual situation of the authorities in Mexico City will be revealed presently," and "steady pressure of moral force will before many days break down the barriers of pride and prejudice."

AMERICANS TO STAY.

Money in Mexico City Object to Departing From There.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—Sebastian Maacho, President of the Mexican state, has sent a telegram to James Scymser, of New York, President of a Mexican telegraph company, requesting him to protest to President Wilson against the withdrawal of American citizens from Mexico. The message, made public here today, declares that the American colony in Mexico "is satisfied and tranquil" and that tremendous damages will result from its withdrawal.

BROUGHT INTO PORT IN IRONS

C. Rumps, Waiter on Breaker, Becomes Frantic on Vessel—Now at Hospital.

C. Rumps, a waiter on the breakwater, is in Mercy Hospital suffering from a severe scalp laceration, after being brought in yesterday in irons.
Capt. T. J. Macgenn stated today that Rumps ran amuck from drinking too much absinthe and when he called, three or four of the crew were unable to handle Rumps. He assisted and he was placed in irons. Captain Macgenn says Rumps has been with the boat some time, is about twenty-five years old and had been a good boy until this occurred.
Rumps aboard the breakwater claim that another member of the crew was the worse for liquor and struck Rumps over the head with a bludgeon, the blow temporarily making him a maniac.
Strate, of North Bend, who is attending Rumps tends to the explanation, saying that Rumps showed no indications of being drunk and he thought the blow was for the frantic efforts put by Rumps afterward. He said he had taken several stitches in the wound and that Rumps was weak from the loss of blood.

FELIX DIAZ TO BE PRESIDENT

Nephew of Former Dictator of Republic Hopes to be Chosen at Coming Election.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—General Felix Diaz, who recently arrived from Canada, said that he was definitely a candidate for President of Mexico. "My friends in Mexico are working in my behalf," said Diaz. "At this distance I, myself, am unable to do much, but I am awaiting instructions which may simplify matters. Even if I am ordered to Japan it is not certain I shall go there. My action will depend on developments in Mexico."
Felix Diaz is apparently pleased at the course of events in Mexico. He said his contention that Victoria Huerta's candidacy for Presidency was barred by the Mexican Constitution is quite correct. Diaz declined to discuss Wilson's message and Mexican notes on the ground that he was debarré because he is an official of the Mexican government.

PLAN TO END BALKAN STRIFE

JEROME THWARTS THAW'S PLANS

Prosecutor Who Secured His Conviction for Stanford White's Murder May Bring Him Back From Canada.

SHERBROOKE, Can., Aug. 30.—Harry Thaw will be produced in court here again Tuesday morning on a writ of habeas corpus obtained today in behalf of the Chief of Police Boudreau of Coaticook, who arrested him after his flight from Matteawan.
Wm. Travers Jerome, who worked out this latest attack, was jubilant. He hopes the writ will be sustained, and that on Thursday Thaw will be in the hands of the Department of Immigration for deportation to Vermont.

Superior Judge Hutchinson granted the writ on application of Samuel Jacobs, Chief Counsellor to New York state's interests. It was the eleventh hour move taken to defeat Thaw's lawyers, who have succeeded

in keeping him in jail, safe from immigration officials. Those of Thaw's lawyers who were in town bitterly opposed the application, but Judge Hutchinson said he would thresh the matter out in open court Tuesday morning.

PLAN TO VOTE ON GYMNASIUM

Marshfield School Board Will Submit Questions to Voters at Fall Election

The Marshfield School Board is making arrangements to submit at the fall election the question of issuing bonds for the erection and equipping of a gymnasium for the school. Preliminary plans for the building are being considered and it is believed that an adequate and up-to-date gymnasium with swimming pool and all can be installed for about \$7,500.

Since the matter was first broached a few weeks ago, many favorable expressions have been heard concerning the plan and it is likely that it will receive almost unanimous approval at the election. The gymnasium is most essential here owing to the extreme rains during the winter months which prevent the children from playing out of doors during the noon hour and recess periods. By utilizing part of the High School grounds, the School Board figure that the project is within their reach, the cost of a special site being thus eliminated.

For School Librarian.

Another question which will probably be submitted at the fall election will be the authorizing of the School Board to engage a School Librarian. By Cooperation, the teachers are securing much benefit for the pupils through the Marshfield Public Library and it is proposed to more closely combine the School and Public Libraries and have the School Librarian act as assistant to Miss Topping. Women Take Prominent Part in Battle With Non-Union Laborers There.

MILITIA CALLED OUT TO PROTECT OFFICIALS

Indignities and Serious Assaults Upon Heads of Various Mines in Region.

CALUMET, Aug. 30.—A company of militia was called out today to protect a party of deputies at the South Kearsage mine from an attack by a large number of copper mine strikers and women. The women were particularly active, spitting in the faces of the deputies and otherwise defying them. Soldiers rescued the Allouze mine foreman, who was attacked by strikers while on his way to work. The strikers took him from a street car and were beating him up when the militia arrived.

Strikers and women sympathizers at the Champion mine resumed their attacks on non-union men today, striking them with sticks dipped in fifth and throwing missiles. One man was severely beaten and three women were arrested.

His Grace came in via Drain and Gardiner, holding services at Gardiner Friday and confirming a class there.
