Men in Charge.—San Francisco papers arriving today state that Arno Merzen personally directed the fight to extinguish the big fire at Bay Point, which destroyed many million feet of lumber last Tuesday night, and that it had not been for his efforts and the use of dynamite under the direction of Theodore Hoker, a dynamite expert from Concord, the docks would also have been burned and the ships endangered. Dynamite was taken out by automobiles to fight the fire. The origin of the fire is not stated, but it is stated that its spread was due to a heavy wind rising about midnight.

Wreathed in smiles, the united pair left the Church to the strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding March.

The bride was simply but beautifully dressed in white satin trimmed in princess lace. She wore a tulle veil and orange blossoms and carried white roses. The maid of honor, Miss Genevieve Sengstacken, wore a beautiful lavender crepe de chine gown and carried pink orange blossoms. 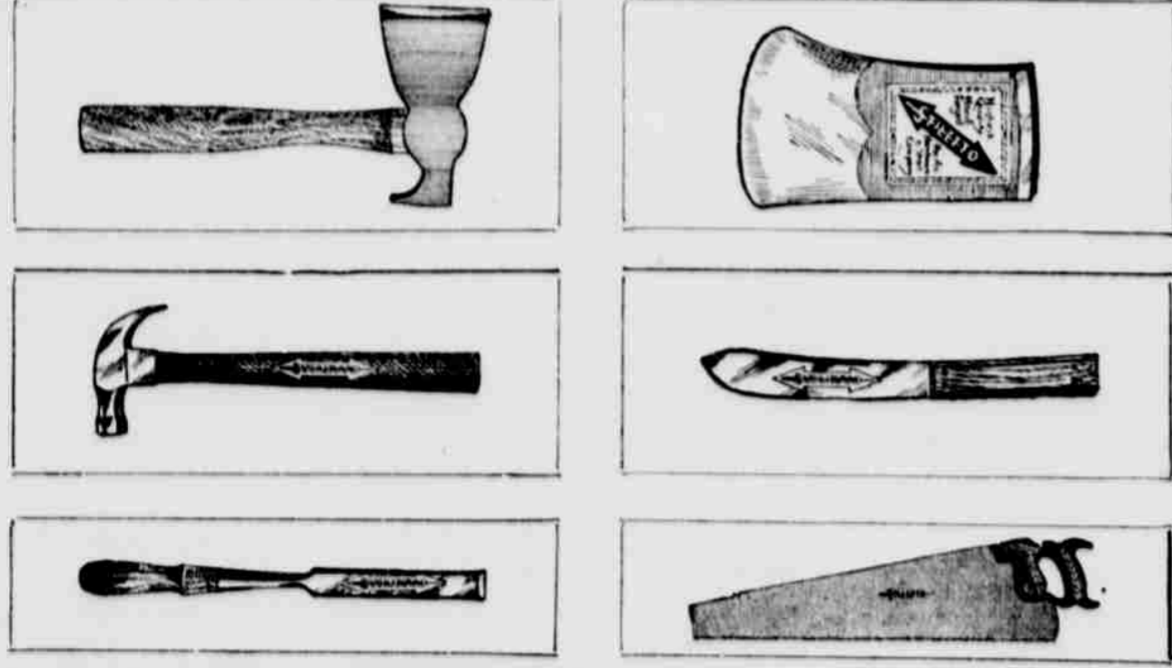
