**Crawford Leaves.**—C. D. Maynard, a local automobilist, left for Myrtle Point Thursday after Attorney General and Mrs. A. M. Crawford, who will return here en route to their home at Salem tomorrow.—Roseburg News.

**Holiday for Uncle Sam's Employees.**—The Postoffice will be open Monday, September 1, Labor Day, from 8 to 9 a. m., for those wishing to call for their mail. There will be no carrier delivery on account of the legal holiday.

**Bicycle Trip.**—Eric Bolt made a bicycle trip from Marshfield to Bandon, going down the coast road and returning via Coquille the first of the week. He made the trip from Coquille to Marshfield in an hour and three quarters, which is the record trip for this season.

**Hurt at Mill.**—Leonard Walters, an employe of the C. A. Smith mill, was seriously and perhaps fatally injured in an accident at the C. A. Smith mill yesterday. Just how it happened could not be ascertained today. Walters has been only partly conscious since the accident. He was badly injured about the head, shoulders and chest. He is at Mercy Hospital.

**Tunnel Done.**—The Eugene Register says: "The two headings on the Noll tunnel met shortly after midnight Thursday morning. The alignment was virtually correct, the two shafts meeting within a fraction of an inch. As was promised, the 325 workmen were given their chicken dinner."

**Farm House Burns.**—Henry Sengstacken today received a long distance telephone message stating that the farm house of C. A. Peterson, Jr., near Riverton and about eight miles below Coquille, had been burned last night. It was a total loss with all the contents. There was \$1500 insurance on it. The origin of the fire was not learned but it is presumed to have been started by a defective flue.

**Five Drunks In.**—Four drunks and one vagrant were arraigned before City Recorder Butler today. Robt. Hamilton, suspected of being the man who scared Mrs. A. O. Haas, was given a half hour to raise \$5 fine or to go to work on the street and he has not been seen since. Paddy O'Shea gave an order on Hauser & O'Shea of North Bend, by whom he is employed, for \$10 to pay his fine. Bill Hart, Joseph Jolly and Thomas Wilson were the others.

Childs, the Blanco Cigar Store and Jack Davis and skipped out with a suit of clothes belonging to Mr. Parker. "David Penwell, who forged a check on the Bank of Bandon for \$50, was sentenced to a term of from one to five years in the penitentiary."
