### REEDSPORT NEWS.

REEDSPORT, Or., Aug. 28.—The tug Roscoe arrived yesterday from Florence with the barge Coquille, loaded with lumber and miscellaneous railroad supplies for Porter Brothers.

**PLANK FLORENCE STREETS**  
City Council Orders About \$10,000 Worth of Work.

At a meeting of the Florence Council Monday evening a petition was presented asking the Council to have a large amount of street planking done. The petition was signed by most of the leading business firms in town, some of whom have heretofore been opposed to planking.

The streets which it is proposed to improve in this way are the following: Main street from the Evangelical Church to Lincoln street where the Masonic Hall stands; Lincoln street from the School House to the river; Front street from the Bank to E. H. Anderson's residence; Washington street from Hurd's corner to the river; Jefferson street and Gardner avenue from the "West" office to Pacific avenue. This will make one and one-half miles of planking and the estimates will cost \$10,000. However, there is not even an appropriation for building shops there at present.

Railroad men say that in the event of construction of the Springfield shops, the Portland carshops would not be removed. The shops here are comparatively small, approximately 300 men being employed. The machine shops would probably be taken to Springfield, it is said, but the general repair shops would undoubtedly remain, and there would not be a difference in the number of men employed here of more than 100 one way or the other.—Florence West.
