SHOPS TO BUILD LATER

Southern Pacific Will Delay Work at Springfield.

PORTLAND, Aug. 30.—A special to the Oregonian from San Francisco says that E. E. Calvin, Vice President of the Southern Pacific was asked to explain the recent purchases of land by the railroad at Springfield, Ore., and the purpose for which the land is to be used. Beyond saying that the land is intended for yard purposes, Mr. Calvin would not comment. It is understood that the railroad intends to establish large car and repair shops here.

From another source comes the information that the company desired to have the realty purchases made in secret, and that it intends moving its shops from East Portland to Springfield as soon as it conveniently do so. The acquisition of the property was the only obstacle to block its plans, it is said. This obstacle has been removed. W. Younger, Superintendent of motive power of the northern division said yesterday that plans for the Springfield shops are still indefinite.

SCHOFFIELD NEWS.

Mrs. Henry Carlson, of Bonneville, Oregon, is the guest of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Johnson.

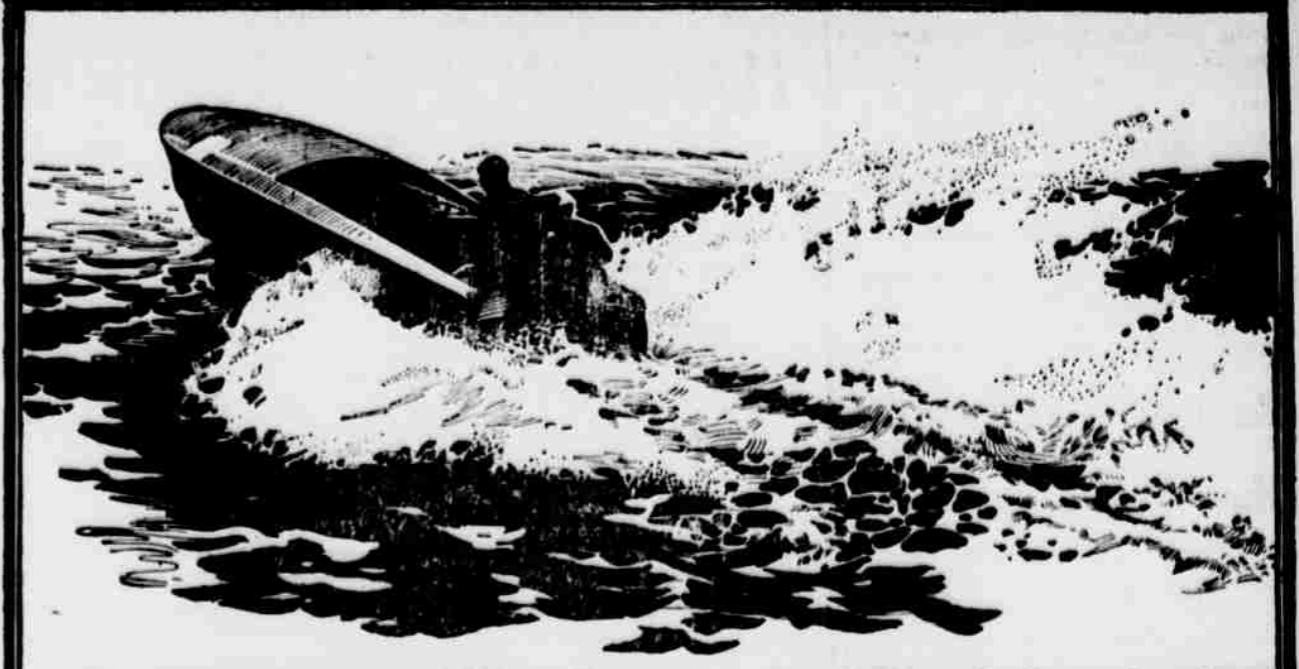
