



## RED LETTER DAY IN BASEBALL

## COAST LEAGUE BASEBALL SCORE

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

NEW YORK, August 30.—A sequence of unusual events and performances marked Tuesday, August 12 as a red letter day in baseball. William Whittaker of the Keokuk Central Association team pitched twenty-one consecutive scoreless innings in a double header between the Waterloo and Keokuk teams. But five hits were made off Whittaker and his team won both games by a score of 1 to 0. The first game went nine innings and the second twelve. In Major League baseball, Reulbach of the Chicago Cubs, on September 26, 1908, pitched two nine-inning games against Brooklyn, winning both without giving the Superbas a run. During the same year Walter Johnson of the Washington Club shut out the New York Americans on September 4, 5, and 7 pitched twenty-seven consecutive innings without allowing a run.

While Whittaker was performing at Keokuk, William Powers, of the New London Club of the Eastern Association, was pitching a double header of eighteen innings in which he shut out the New Haven team without a run and allowed but eight hits. At the same hour the Toronto and Jersey City Clubs of the International League, were playing a twenty-inning scoreless tie game in which Pitcher Hearne of the Toronto Club, twirled the full distance, allowing but six hits. Minor league history shows that his twenty-inning scoreless game was duplicated by the Cleburne and Fort Worth Clubs of the Texas League on July 17, 1906, when, as in the case of Jersey City and Toronto the game was called on account of darkness after the twentieth inning.

The chronicles of the day's unusual baseball features do not end with these feats. August 12 marked the seventeenth anniversary of Napoleon Lajoie's entry into big league baseball. It was also Christy Mathewson's thirty-third birthday, and he celebrated it by being a material factor in the Giants' victory over the Brooklyn Club in an eleven inning game. The National Baseball commission took advantage of the occasion to get into the limelight with a ruling to the effect that a baseball player who owed another money in the form of a personal debt could be suspended from organized baseball until such time as he paid the debt.

Although a day late, Pitcher Hedgepath of the Richmond Club of the Virginia League performed a spectacular twirling feat on August 12, when he officiated in both games of a double-header against Petersburg allowing one hit, three bases on balls and no runs. Hedgepath, who is slated for the Washington Americans was opposed in the first game by Pitcher Ayers, who until defeated by Hedgepath, had a record of thirteen straight victories. Ayers will also join the Washington Club this fall.

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received by the Finance Committee of the Common Council of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, at the office of the City Recorder of said city of Marshfield, in the City Hall of said city, until 4 o'clock p. m., of Monday, the first day of September, 1913, for the purchase of street improvement bonds to the amount of \$174,20, of the said city of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon.

All of said improvement bonds to be in denomination not exceeding \$500 and bearing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum from date thereof, payable semi-annually; said bonds to be dated the day of issuance and to mature in ten years thereafter, with prepayment option thereon at face value and accrued interest to date of any semi-annual coupon interest period at, or after, one year from the date of said bonds, upon giving notice by publication in a newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in Coos County, Oregon, such notice to be published not less than twice during the month preceeding such semi-annual period at which such payment thereof will be made. The right is expressly reserved to reject any and all bids and upon all or any of such bids, or proposals, being rejected, if there should remain any bonds unsold, the said bonds may be thereafter sold at private sale by said Common Council of said City of Marshfield, Oregon, but in no event to be sold at less than par and accrued interest. Said bonds are authorized by the laws of the State of Oregon and ordinances of the Common Council of the said City of Marshfield, Oregon.

Assessed valuation of said City of Marshfield, Oregon, is \$2,271,659. Bonded indebtedness is \$54,000. Population, estimated at 5000. A certified check for 5 per centum of amount bid, or proposal must accompany each bid to be forfeited to said City of Marshfield in case bid is accepted and bidder fails to accept and make payment for said bond or bonds, covered thereby, within ten days from date of acceptance of said bid or bids.
