PLAN NEW BOAT.

Paunter Bros. To Build Fine One at Prosper.

The Myrtle Point Transportation Company (Captain Russell Paunter and Captain Walter Paunter), owners of the Dora and the Myrtle, the steamers which for several years have been making daily trips between this city and Bandon, will put another larger and faster boat on the run. Orders have already been placed for the boilers and engines and soon work will be commenced at the Prosper shipyards on the vessel itself. The new boat is to be christened the Telegraph, and will have a capacity of 98 tons. It will be 85 feet long, 10 feet longer than the Dora and have 275 horsepower, which is 100 more than the Dora possesses. The interior finishings and furnishings will be the finest of any boat on the Coquille River trade and will compare favorably with any on the Pacific Coast. It is expected that the Telegraph will be ready for service in about 90 days.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
