BUELL ENDS TRIP.

Says 2000 Men Are Employed On Coos Bay Line.

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 13.—After a 19-day trip to the Siuslaw and the lakes below there, J. L. Buell, right of way agent for the Southern Pacific, accompanied by his wife and two daughters returned well pleased with their excursion. The journey was made as far as Mapleton in their machine, which they left at this place because of the trouble in ferrying it across the rivers. A visit was made to the new road of the Willamette-Pacific, where they report 2000 men busy on the construction work. The new road between Lake Creek bridge and Mapleton of thirteen miles, which has been made to replace the road taken over by the railroad company they said was at present in bad shape. By stage they went to Five and Ten Mile Lakes and continued on as far as Gardiner, where they turned back because of the wind and rain.
