**McCutcheon Indicted.**—J. M. McCutcheon of Beaver Hill has been indicted again for liquor law violation, being charged with selling to a minor on Sunday. Sheriff Gage, who came over yesterday served him and McCutcheon appeared in Court today.

**Steal Bees.**—About the boldest theft that has been reported on the Bay in a long time was the theft of a hive of bees, said to contain about 150 pounds of honey, from the home of Miss Anna Kinney, daughter of Major L. D. Kinney, at Plat B. There is no trace of the culprit.

**Father Dead.**—Word has been received here of the death of the father of Geo. W. King of the Enterprise Meat Market at Montague, Cal. Mr. King has been away on a stock buying trip and so far friends there have been unable to get word to him. He is expected to return soon.

**Concert Tonight.**—Director Fenton, of the Coos Bay Concert Band announces that the concert this evening will be given at the Masonic Opera House instead of on Front street as was first announced. It is getting a little too cool in the evenings for out-door concerts.

**Loses Straps.**—J. B. Sneddon, one of the Marshfield mail carriers, says that he has lost probably a dozen mail straps since he started carrying and not yet has a single strap been returned to him. The straps are branded "U. S." but he can't get them back after he once lets go of them.

**High Flight.**—Aviator Steele says that he reached a height of 5700 feet in the hydroplane Sunday. This is considerably over a mile. Parties who were watching his high ascension can scarcely believe that he was that high, but he has an instrument on the machine to determine the height.

**No News of Wealth.**—Mrs. Jas. Bennett says there have not been any particular developments in the \$9,000,000 estate in which Mr. Bennett has a one-quarter interest. The old estate, which has been lying dormant for a hundred years or more at New York will require much litigation and meanwhile they are not losing any sleep over it, he says.

**Starts Fruit Dryer.**—F. S. Dow has started his fruit dryer at Myrtle Point on the prune crop. He expects to dry about forty tons of all kinds of fruit there this season. He has an expert named Turner in charge of the plant. The dryer is affording a market at a good price for all surplus fruit and will eliminate the losses hitherto sustained by fruit growers of that section.

**New Time Card.**—The new time card on the local railway went into effect yesterday. The afternoon train leaves every day now at 2 o'clock and returns at 5:45. The morning train leaves every morning at 8 o'clock and returns at 12:10 except Mondays and Thursdays, when it runs into Beaver Hill. The new arrangement will be much more satisfactory to the traveling public.

**District K. of P. Convention.**—The members of Myrtle Lodge No. 3, Knights of Pythias, are making preparations to royally entertain the visiting Knights and their ladies at the sixth annual district convention to be held here next Monday. Delegations will be present from Bandon, Coquille, Myrtle Point and North Bend, and a very pleasant time is anticipated. The committee of arrangements is George Ross, L. A. Whereat and D. L. Rood.

**For Daily Paper.**—Edgar McDaniels, of North Bend, was a Marshfield business visitor today. He said that J. A. Smith, formerly of Boise, and a man from Honolulu, are figuring on starting a daily paper in North Bend. Mr. Smith is now here and his associate is to come from Honolulu soon to look the field over. Nothing definite has been done yet. Mr. McDaniels, who

has been making an excellent weekly paper at North Bend, has been figuring on enlarging it and making it a semi-weekly or possibly issue more frequently as the development there would justify it.

**Baseball Trouble.**—The Coos County League affairs will be aired in the Courts as a result of an injunction suit begun by Messrs Clayton Meade, J. T. Sullivan and R. E. L. Bedillion against President Henry Kern and the other officials restraining them from disbursing the \$250 deposit money. Kern threw out a number of Bandon victories on the ground that they were playing more than three imported men. The money was to be divided, \$150 to the winner of the pennant and \$100 to the second team, but owing to the wrangle over the result, it was proposed to refund \$50 to each team.
