The fur buyer must be well informed as to the general tendencies of fashion, and be able to distinguish between the genuine novelty, destined to be the coming mode, and the "freak" which may prove a sensation early in the season but will be a sad disappointment a month hence.

Many coats, especially in the shorter lengths, are trimmed with a contrasting fur. The trimming is used in the new short collars which are considered very smart, and wide, shallow cuffs.

Passioneries of all sorts and fancy buttons are conspicuous by their absence. Fur buttons are seen on almost every coat and on many sets.

Fur sets are conservative. Moderation at every point seems to be the accepted rule.
