TALK NO. 1.

The term "headache" has been and is now so commonly used, not only by the general public, but by the physicians themselves, that it includes almost every kind of head pain.

As a matter of fact, a headache is only a symptom, and indicates some derangements in the system. The cause of the headache may be so remote as to be entirely overlooked, as, for example, it may be from constipation, or from so local a cause as eye-strain. It may be induced by sleeping in poorly-ventilated rooms, or it may be caused by overwork and fatigue. Not infrequently it is a symptom of kidney disease, or it may be due entirely to a catarrhal condition of the head, nose or throat, or any other minor trouble that may affect the large air cavities in the forehead and face connected with the nose.
