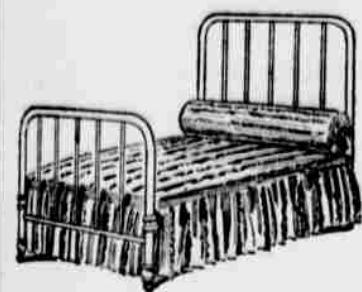

GRAVES HEARING NEARLY DONE

Expect to Conclude Testimony at Night Session Tonight.

GRAVES NOT LEADER.

A dozen business men who testified this afternoon are said to have stated that Graves was not the leader of the deportation—it fact there didn't seem to be any leader. Graves will go on the stand late today.

The hearing of the disbarment proceedings against R. O. Graves will probably be completed before Referee C. R. Peck this evening. A night session was held last evening and they were in session all forenoon, the presentation of evidence against Graves being completed at noon. The evidence in Mr. Graves' behalf will be submitted this afternoon and evening. C. R. Peck has to go to Gardiner tomorrow and so it is necessary to complete it.

C. F. McKnight, Mr. Graves' counsel stated at noon, that no showing had been made against Mr. Graves or to substantiate C. H. McLaughlin's charges. Most of the evidence was of a general nature about the deportation, little tending to show that Graves had any particular part in it.

The witnesses called to prove McLaughlin's charges were E. Don McCrary, Andrew Storgard, Alex Storgard, Dan Dillinger, Rev. A. F. Bassford, C. H. McLaughlin and Dave Holden, the latter being to testify late today.

McLaughlin's Evidence.

McLaughlin was on the stand this morning and his knowledge of the affair was heresy, saying that he had been informed by others of the matter he had put in the charges against Graves.

There were some hot passages between McLaughlin and Mr. McKnight. McLaughlin testified that he had been earning from \$75 to \$125 per month the past year, but admitted that he had recently made application to the County Court for allowances to support his step-children.

Smith Tells Story.

Last night B. B. Smith told much of the details of the I. W. W. and its beliefs, etc. He said that he was a believer in it, but not a member because they didn't have any organization. He referred to his affiliation as the Industrial Union. He said that they urged a general strike until capital was forced to give them what they wanted.

A lot of the evidence given was objected to by Mr. Graves' attorneys, but C. R. Peck admitted it, saying that the Supreme Court could sift out what they did not think was admissible.

Some of the witnesses testified that Policemen Carter, Shoupe and Smith and Richardson had witnessed the deportation. Some testified that Mayor Stray did. Some declared that Sheriff Gage was within a few feet of it.

A man who signed his name as Feller in a letter to Gov. West charged that Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist witnessed it, but no one has ever been able to find who Feller is or where he is. Liljeqvist says he has three witnesses to prove he was trying a case in Justice Pennock's Court at the time.

An immense amount of detail and talk has been recited by the various witnesses.
